Hon. H. Burd Cassel

The Honorable H. Burd Cassel, 71, former member of the State Legislature and congressman from 1901 to 1906, died at his home in Marietta last Wednesday from the effects of a stroke suffered Sunday night.

Born in Marietta, October 19, 1854, and educated in the public schools of his birthplace and the neighboring town of Columbia, he became associated with his father in the lumber business under the firm of A. N. Cassel and Son.

In the same year, he was elected to the state legislature, re-elected and elected again in 1900. In August 1901, he was elected to Congress, and was re-elected in 1902, 1904, and 1906.

Mr. Cassel was first married to Mary Ann Patterson, daughter of James and Mary Patterson, of Mt. Joy, in July 1877. There were five children: Howard Neff Cassel, of Lancaster; M. Effie Cassel, Frances Patterson Cassel, both of Washington; Henry Cassel, of Cleveland and Walter Patterson Cassel, of Los Angeles. Mrs. Cassel died in 1911. Seven years later Mr. Cassel married Madeline Voigt, daughter of Frederick and Anna Evans,

Voigt, of Camden, New Jersey. The funeral was held Saturday.

Hon. W. L. Hershey

Hon. Washington L. Hershey died last Wednesday evening at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Staley, at Florin, from infirmities due to old age. He was born at Sporting Hill on December 14, 1844.

The deceased was a veteran of the Civil War and at one time served in the State Legislature. During the Spanish American War he was quartermaster at Cuba. For a number of years he served as a member of the Marietta Borough council. He was a member of L. T. William H. Child Post, No. 226, G. A. R.; Donegal Lodge No. 129, Odd Fellows; Red Men, No. 292; Knights of Pythias, No. 108; Knights of the Golden Eagle No. 292, and Encampment No. 76. He was also a member of the Lancaster County Historical Society.

He is survived by the following children: Alvin, Elizabethtown; Mrs. Nora Berntheizel, of Philadelphia; Mrs. John Kolb and Mrs. Willis Boyles, both of Lancaster; Mrs. Chester Fuhrman and Mrs. Milton G. McElroy, both of Marietta; and Mrs. Charles Staley, of Florin. Twenty-two grandchildren, 18 great grandchildren, and two brothers, Abram, of Silver Spring, and Webster of Lancaster.

Services were held Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Staley, Florin. Interment was made in the Silver Spring cemetery.

WOULD PUNISH AUTOISTS WHO RUN DOWN RABBITS

As the result of a survey by Pennsylvania sportsmen for "drastic" action against motorists who deliberately run down rabbits at night, the State Game Commission, in a statement today, asked all drivers to exercise care in night driving and "not to purposely run down the state's game mammals and birds."

"If an automobile driver deliberately shoots a rabbit on the road at night, he is fined," Seth E. Gordon, secretary said. "If an automobile driver deliberately kills a rabbit by running it down with his automobile he should be prosecuted just as a person who kills one with a shot gun or other device contrary to law."

"Too many rabbits are killed by tourists just for the sake of being smart," as one sportsman put it. "Thousands of cotton-tails are killed on the public highways by automobiles, and in most cases, it is avoidable."

303,129 LICENSES FOR DOGS IN STATE

A total of 303,129 individual dog licenses were issued in Pennsylvania the first two months of this year, an increase of 12,400 over the same period in 1925, officials in the State department of agriculture announced today. The licenses cover a period of one year.

In these first two months Westmoreland county led the other counties in protecting its dogs by issuance of 13,572 licenses. There were approximately 12,000 licenses issued in Allegheny county and more than 10,000 each in Berks, Chester and York counties.

COUNTY NOW PRODUCES 60,000,000 EGGS YEARLY

Lancaster county furnishes 5,000,000 dozens of eggs for the State annually a recent survey by the Bureau of Markets shows.

Of this number, Pennsylvanians use about 200 eggs each annually. The value of more than 17,000,000 chickens in 1925 was placed at \$22,000,000 and the value of the 79,000,000 dozen eggs produced at \$29,190,000.
