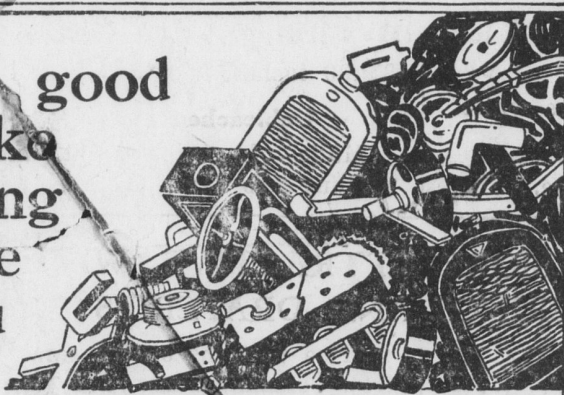

The Produce and Live Stock Market

CORRECT INFORMATION FURNISHED WEEKLY BY THE PENNA. BUREAU OF MARKETS FOR THE BULLETIN

MARKET: Slow and draggy on all classes, killing stock little action thru out week. Comparisons with week ago: Beef steers steady to weak, bidding lower, top \$9.45, several loads held considerably higher, bulk of sales \$8.25-9.00. Bulls and heifers about steady. Cows slow, little doing early, barely steady, bulk near \$4.25-5.50. Calves steady, top vealers, 14.50.
HOGS: Slow, steady, top West-erns 14.75; bulk 14.05-14.50.
RECEIPTS: For today's market: Cattle 4 cars from Penna., containing 93 head; 396 head trucked in from nearby farms, total cattle 489 head; 10 calves, 19 hogs. Receipts for week ending May 1, 1926: Cattle 20 cars—15 from Penna.; 1 Chicago; 1 Virginia; 1 West Va.; 1 St. Paul; 1 Indiana, containing 468 head; 1031 head trucked in, total cattle 1499 head; 15 calves; 468 hogs. Compared with previous week: Cattle 20 cars, containing 493 head, 873 head trucked in, total cattle 136 head; 97 calves; 142 hogs.

Potato Market Stronger
Both old and new potatoes are meeting a more active demand and during the latter part of the week prices have advanced. Pennsylvania 150 lb. sacks round whites sold for \$7.25-7.75 a sack on Monday and advanced to \$8.00 per sack at the close of the week. New potatoes weakened during the first part of the week but prices advanced at the close. The shipping point markets are firm to slightly stronger, according to the Pennsylvania and Federal Bureau of Markets.
New Jersey asparagus has been arriving more freely and the demand has been fairly active thru-out the week. There is a wide range in quality and prices. There was good demand for green stock but white and poor quality asparagus moved slow. Southern grass was still in light supply on Saturday and moved readily at slightly higher prices.
The apple situation is practically unchanged and the market continues about steady for good stock, with poor to ordinary offerings in light demand. New York spinach has been more plentiful during week. The supplies of southern stock was liberal and market weak. Jersey turnip tops were in light demand and prices declined, at the close of the week. The supplies of nearby rhubarb were liberal and market ranged from dull to slightly weaker. Mushroom market was dull during the first part of the week. The demand improved at the close and there was a slight advance in prices.

DANGEROUS METHODS: For several years the various medical journals have been telling of the dangers of X-ray and radium in various forms.

I spent several hours with one physician who had previously been an X-ray enthusiast but he had disposed of all of his equipment and would not go near an X-ray machine while in operation.

He stated that unless protected by lead, every person within sight of an X-ray machine while in operation, was more or less injured.

One of my friends, a splendid surgeon, was so badly burned that he lost a part of one hand.

ANNUAL REPORT SHOWS UNIFICATION PROGRESS

Bell and Independent Telephone Companies Eliminate Dual Telephone Service in Many Communities

Much progress was made during the past year toward the elimination of dual telephone service in many communities in Pennsylvania, says the 1925 annual report of The Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, recently released.

Purchases of telephone property amounting to \$3,038,000 were made by the Bell Company from other telephone companies. Sales of Bell property to other companies, with the same end in view, aggregated \$5,722,000.

Six of these transactions were of considerable magnitude, says the report. The largest involved the Lehigh Telephone Company, operating in eastern and northeastern Pennsylvania. To that company the Bell sold 32,757 telephones and property in and around Allentown, Bethlehem, Easton and Scranton. The Pennsylvania Bell Company purchased from that company 11,342 telephones and other property in and around Reading, Scranton and Wilkes-Barre.

The Bell Company sold the principal parts of its Meadville and Sager-ton exchange properties, involving 1260 telephones, to the Meadville Telephone Company.

From the Penn State Telephone Company, the Bell Company purchased property in several counties in central Pennsylvania, including Altoona, Lancaster, Pottsville and Sunbury, embracing 42 exchanges serving 12,525 telephones.
