CHARTER NOTICE (First Class)

Notice is hereby given that on the 19th day of June, A.D. 1926, at 10 o'clock A. M. an application will be made in the Court of Common Pleas of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, under an Act of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to provide for the Incorporation and Regulation of Certain Corporations", approved the 29th day of April, A.D. 1874, and the several supplements thereto, by Walter N. Heisey, Henry Hilsner, Solomon Hoffman, Henry B.
