NUMEROUS DISCREPANCIES SHOWN AT HEARING BE-TWEEN BANK STATE-MENTS AND BOOKS

The return of stocks and cash ransferred to creditors by members of the bankrupt Nissly concerns within four months of the filling of involuntary petitions in bankruptcy s sought by Trustee John Hertzler for the benefit of all creditors of the bankrupt estate, in a move made at the Nissly hearing before Referee Redmond Conyngham in Court

Counsel for the trustee asked the referee to make an order on certain creditors preferred by bank-rupts during the four months prior to February 23, 1926, to turn over to the trustee by stocks or cash received by them during that period from the bankrupts, on account of

pre-existing debts.

H. Roy Nissly testifying before the referee, declared emphatically that the statement of the Nissly as sets and liabilities dated March 28, 1925, which was submitted to banks for the puropse of obtaining loans, was a correct statement of he financial standing of the firms. When called to the stand he was questioned concerning discrepancies
