### Recent Local Real Estate Matters

#### THE VARIOUS HOFFMAN PROPERTIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY ARE BEING SOLD BY TRUSTEES

The trustees in bankruptcy of Michael R. Hoffman are busy selling the real estate throughout the county. The following has thus far been disposed of:

Four Hoffman properties near Maytown Friday brought \$11,680 at a sale conducted by trustees Jno. Hertzler, Charles Hager and John A. Coyle. Two houses, a farm and several lots were sold.

The Darby farm, containing 126 acres, was bought by Norman C. White and Dale C. Hannigan for \$70 an acre. Albert S. Riser purchased the Billet house in East Donegal township for \$905. The Boll lots, in Maytown, were sold to Elijah Boll for \$450, and the Klugh house, in Maytown, for \$1505 to Harry H. Springer.

The farm in East Drumore township was sold on Saturday at public sale by the trustees in bankruptcy of the Hoffman estate. The farm containing 345 acres was purchased by Jacob G. Swope, Rowenna, E. Donegal township for \$36.40 per acre. There were about a half dozen bidders.

The Forney farm, East Donegal township, property of the Hoffmans Thursday was purchased by B. J. Myers and John A. Coyle at a public sale. The farm containing 123 acres and 153 perches, brought \$110 per acre. A large house, barn, several tobacco sheds and other out buildings were included in the property. Later they sold the farm to Dr. J. S. Kendig, of Salunga, at \$125 per acre.

Thursday the "Conoy Farm" in Conoy township containing 74 acres was sold for \$155 per acre to C. C. Forrey, of East Donegal township. There is a dwelling house and other necessary buildings on the place.

The "Conoy Mill" property and the "Rhoads Farm," both in Conoy township, were sold to C. R. Hoffman, of Elizabethtown, for \$4,105. There are 24 acres and 135 perches in the former with a 2 1/2 story frame dwelling house and other outbuildings, and in the latter farm there are 87 acres and 79 perches with a brick dwelling house and out buildings.

The "Bull Moose Farm" in East Donegal township, one of the farms of the Hoffmans who have gone into bankruptcy was sold Tuesday afternoon on the premises by the trustees, John Hertzler, John A. Coyle and Charles F. Hager. The farm was sold in two parts, one part containing 98 acres and 62 perches was sold to Christ Lease, of East Donegal township, for \$12,298.44 at the rate of \$125 per acre. The other part containing 55 acres and 155 perches was bought by Benjamin G. Bricker, of Landisville, for \$7,848.93, or \$140.50 per acre. There is a brick dwelling and a frame house, together with other outbuildings on the farms.

**Executions Issued**  
The Lancaster Trust Company, through the law firm of Zimmerman, Myers and Keady, has issued an execution against Horace E. Heisey, East Donegal township, for a debt of \$2,500.

Frank C. Witmer has issued an execution against the same defendant for a debt of \$3,500.

### THE NEW STANDARD MAKES MANY FREEZERS

Home made ice cream is not a thing of the past. Regardless of the many ice cream manufacturing plants throughout the country, ice cream, the popular American sweet, is still made in the home kitchen. And much of this home-made ice cream is made in freezers manufactured right here in Mount Joy. As many as 4,000 freezers are manufactured a day, during the height of the season, by the New Standard Corporation.

Another interesting home device which will be placed on the market by this local plant, is an electric apparatus invented by a Canadian. The model, from which the product will be similarly fashioned, is a combination electric iron, electric heater and an electric toaster and cooker.

The whole affair is enclosed in a neat metal box and when the box is opened it serves as a stand for the iron and forms the base for the other two devices.

### River Road Will Be Route No. 470

#### THIS WILL INTEREST ALL WHO FAVOR THE ROAD ALONG THE RIVER FROM MIDDLETOWN SOUTH

An act of the Legislature, passed by that body April 8, 1925, that will be of much information and importance to the hundreds of members of the Susquehanna River Road Association, concerning the route of the proposed River Road, is as follows:

Establishing certain public roads as State highways and providing for their construction and maintenance at the expense of the Commonwealth—Route 470, beginning at Center Square in the Borough of Middletown, Dauphin county and running thence south on Union street to the bridge across the Swatara creek, thence to Royalton, Falmonth and Collins, to a point north of Bainbridge and intersecting with State Highway Route No. 280; thence over said Route No. 280 to Bainbridge square, thence south through Bainbridge by way of Billmeyer and Rowenna to Marietta, and again intersecting with State Highway Route No. 280; thence over State Highway Route No. 280 to Columbia, thence to and through Washington Boro.

This was the original route, with an amended route to and through Washington Boro, as was mapped out by Dr. Eugene Laverty, one of Middletown's leading druggists and foremost advocate of good roads, who was the originator of the first River Road bill.

Backed by the Middletown Automobile Club, the Susquehanna River Road route was finally enacted into the Omnibus Bill and passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor.

#### SEEKS \$2,000 DAMAGES FOR PERSONAL INJURIES

Colonel John M. Groff, attorney for John Musser, of State College, has filed suit in Common Pleas Court against John N. Stehman, East Hempfield township, claiming \$2,000 damages for personal injuries received in an automobile accident several weeks ago at the cross roads in East Petersburg. Musser alleges Stehman was driving carelessly and negligently when he crashed into the automobile in which Musser was a passenger.
