dragged him into shallow water. When some distance from the shore Mr. Schwanger, completely exhausted, let go of the rope. Messrs. Peter Risser, Elmer Ober and Samuel Meckley, other witnesses, quickly went to his assistance, and wading into the stream they carried him ashore.

He was removed to the house of Mr. Peter Risser nearby and Dr. A. F. Snyder summoned. Schwanger showed no signs of life and reports were immediately circulated that he was drowned.

After working with him for two hours Dr. Snyder learned that it was a case of collapse and that Schwanger was not drowned.

The unfortunate man recovered sufficiently to be removed to his home that evening.

Schwanger's horse succeeded in breaking loose from the wagon and swimming ashore.
