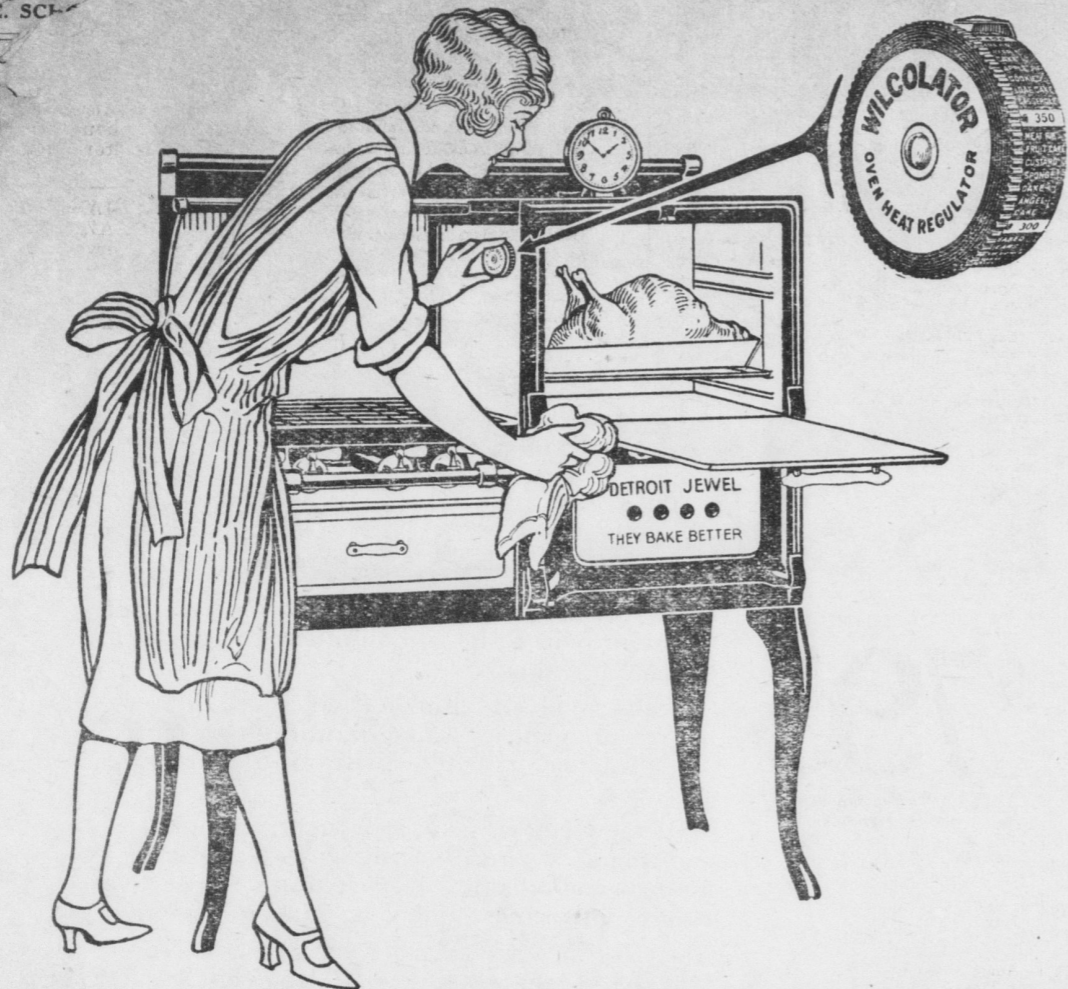

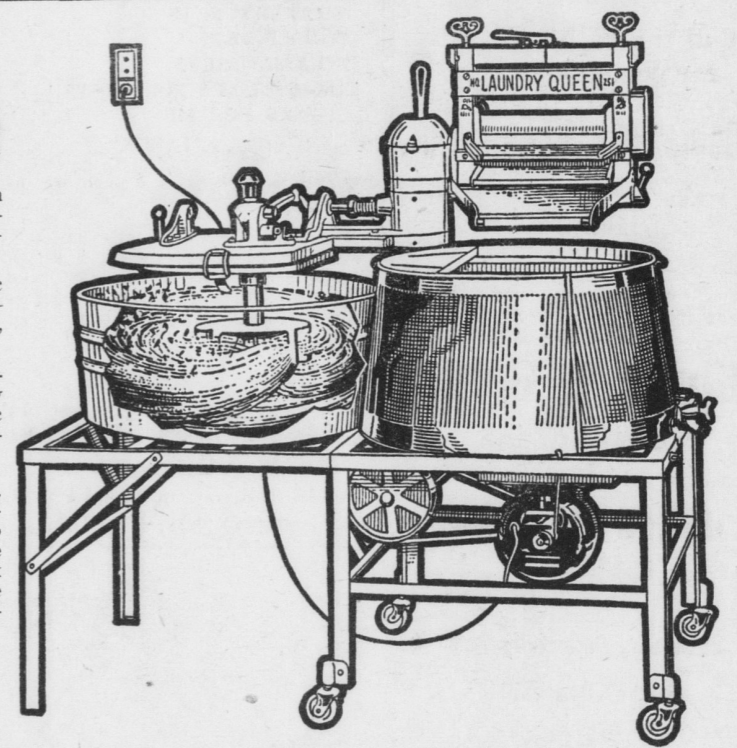

A representative of a road oil concern appeared before council.
Mr. Miller stated that he had a number of complaints about all day and all night parking of cars on the streets of the boro. The matter was referred to the Street committee.
