The personnel of the Thomas E. Hoffman gave this information after a half-hour's grilling during which time he attempted to disclaim any knowledge as to the personnel of the syndicate.

While every attorney involved knew privately who composed the syndicate, Hoffman was placed on the stand to give the names so they would get into the record.

Threats of contempt of court proceedings and advice of attorneys finally caused Hoffman to abandon






