

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE LAYING OUT A FIFTY FEET WIDE STREET FROM BARBARA STREET TO THE MT. JOY HIGH SCHOOL IN THE BOROUGH OF MOUNT JOY TO BE KNOWN AS MARY STREET.

Be it enacted by the Council of the Borough of Mount Joy as follows: SECTION 1. That a street to be known as Mary Street be placed upon the plan of the Borough, or-dained, established and opened from South Barbara Street to the Mount Joy High School property.

SECTION 2. That the width of the said street shall be fifty feet and shall begin at the intersection of Barbara Street with the proposed new street a distance of five hundred ninety-seven and five-tenths (597.5) feet south of South Alley and shall thence extend north-westerly to the proposed Walnut St., a distance of two hundred and seventy (270) feet on the North side thereof and a distance of two hundred and fifty-five (255) feet on the South side thereof, thence West-wardly crossing Walnut Street as proposed to be opened, Dea Street as proposed to be opened, and South Market Street, a total distance from Walnut Street of nine hundred (900) feet to the Mount Joy High School property.

Enacted into an ordinance January 3rd, 1927.
