Apple Market Dull
The apple market was dull with very few sales reported. Pennsylvania 3 in Yorks sold at \$2.25 per barrel with some fancy stock as high as \$2.75, while 2 1/2 inch Staymains brought \$2.50, according to the Pennsylvania and Federal Bureau of Markets.

Pennsylvania mushrooms were in moderate supply and held steady with prices ranging from 40c to \$1.25 per 3 pound basket. Celery was in fair demand with Pennsylvania wired bunches selling at 14c to 23c per bunch.

Cabbage moved slowly with Savoy bringing 80c to \$1.00 per bushel. Carrots brought \$1.25 to \$1.30 per bushel. Beets were steady and sold at 35c to 65c per 5-8 basket, parsnips at 90c to \$1.00 and white turnips bringing 50c-55c.

The potato market was dull and trading was very slow. Pennsylvania round whites sold at \$3.00 to \$3.25 per 120 pound sack while Maine's brought \$3.20 to \$3.25.

MARKET: Today showing more action, comparisons with week ago, beef steers firm, quality mostly moderate to good, top \$10.25, several loads nearby fed 1300-1400 pound averages. Top yearlings \$9.85, bulk of sales \$8.75-9.25. Bulls steady, bulk bolognas \$6.25-7.50, she stock and all cutters steady, bulk cows \$4.50-6.00. Stockers and feeders firm mostly to killers. Calves showing stronger tendency, no choice offerings.

HOGS: Strong, desirable 160-250 lb weights 25c higher, top westerns \$14. bulk \$13.50-13.75.

ROAD PEDESTRIANS MAY HAVE TO CARRY LIGHTS

Several bills of particular interest to motorists generally have been presented in the Legislature convening at Harrisburg.

A bill of Representative Conner would deny motor licenses to any but financially responsible or insured persons.

Pedestrians walking in the actual roadway of any public highway at night would be compelled to carry lights, under the provisions of a bill introduced by Representative Donnell, Venango. Persons not carrying lights would be deemed guilty of negligence.

Sunday fishing would be made legal in a bill offered by Representative Horn, Northampton. His bill repeals an act of 1925 which prohibits fishing on Sunday.

LOCAL RECTOR HOME FROM TRIP TO WASHINGTON

Womelsdorf—Plans discussed for erecting new school building to replace present buildings at High and Third Streets.

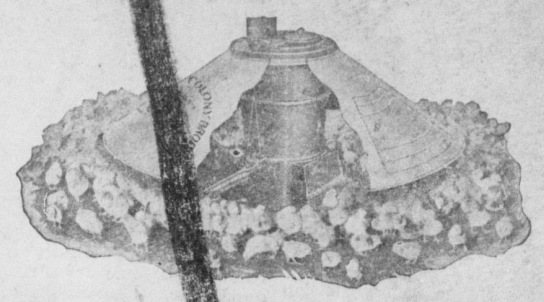
