Mt. Joy's Recruits In The Civil War

OLD PAPER FOUND CONTAIN-ING A COMPLETE LIST OF THE MEN DRAFTED AND AMOUNTS SUB-SCRIBED.

It was while making alterations the former Eberle building, on East Main street, that a copy of the Mt. Joy Star and News dated Fri-day, August 12, 1892, was found that contains some interesting history concerning Mount Joy citizens during the Civil War. There was a double floor in one part of this building and the paper referred to above was one of many that was found between the floors.

An article in the paper states that Dr. A. Gerber kindly furnished a report of the Finance Recruiting committee of Mount Joy for 1864

It gives a report of the committees appointed at a town meeting on the evening of the 22nd of January, 1864, to relieve the boro of Mount Joy from draft under the call for 500,000 troops by filling the quota with recruits obtained by means of local bounty.


