14 NEW MEMBERS IN THE EVANGELICAL CHURCH

Easter Sunday brought the total accessions for the year to fourteen in number. During the past two weeks there were 5 conversions, and 6 accessions on Easter morning. At this service, Helen Margaret Hockenberry, child of Mr. and Mrs. James Hockenberry received the rite of infant baptism, and the Lord's Supper was celebrated. At the evening service the third Teacher Training Class of the church was graduated. Those graduating were: Mrs. Calvin Kramer, Miss Julia Fair, and Miss Amanda Wittle. Each of the members of the class read an Essay prepared by themselves relative to the Sunday School work and preparation for it. The records for the year have been closed, preparatory to Annual Conference, and show the total receipts for the year amounting to \$3,138.52. The church contributed \$296.69 toward Missions; \$538.03 toward other benevolent purposes and \$2006.11 was used on the field. The Sunday school received 37 new scholars since January of the present year, and raised \$616.33 for the year. Ten of the Sunday School scholars were converted during the past year. The C. E. Society, during the same period raised \$130.01.
Thus far during the present pastorate of three years, there have been 50 accessions into church membership, and 35 conversions. The pastor officiated during the same period, at 11 marriages, 21 baptisms and 16 funerals. At present, the prayer meeting room of the church is undergoing complete interior renovation. The church is free of all debt, and is blessed with prosperous circumstances.

Sow Some Alfalfa
Alfalfa seed is lower in price than clover, so it is advisable to mix some with the clover this spring. Sow two-thirds of the regular rate of red clover with 8 to 15 pounds of alfalfa per acre. North-western-grown seed is good for most parts of the state, and Canadian Varigated is adaptable to the northern sections. Be sure to inoculate.
