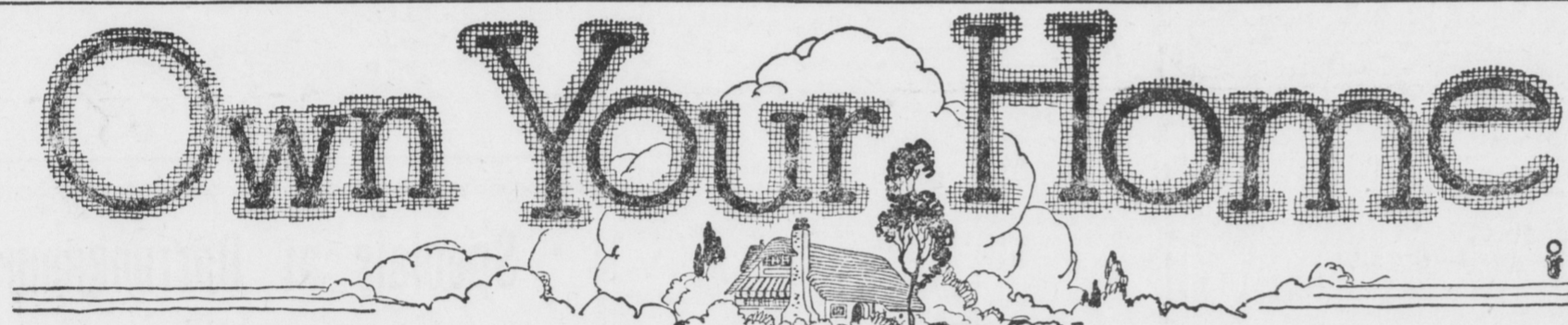
LONGACRE, LONGAKER, LONGENECKER FAMILY REUNION
