MARKET: Showing usual week-end dullness, few sales early. Beef steers steady, compared with week ago fully steady, firmer tendency on better grades, weeks top for heavies \$12.50, medium weights \$12.00, bulk of sales \$10.50-11.50. Bulls and heifers steady, cows steady to strong, low cutters steady at weeks advance, bulk medium bulls \$7.25-8.00, butcher cows \$6.00-\$6.00-7.00, cutters \$4.00-\$5.50. Stockers and feeders about steady, slow movement, bulk of sales \$7.00-\$8.25. Calves steady, top vealers \$15.50.

HOGS: Tending steady with weeks 25c advance.

RECEIPTS: For toays market cattle 12 cars, 7 St. Paul; 3 St. Louis; 1 Chicago; 1 Kansas City; containing 412 head, 27 head trucked in from nearby farms, total cattle 439 head, 15 calves, Receipts for week ending Aug 6 1927: cattle 139 cars; 38 Va.; 35 St. Paul; 21 Chicago; 10 W. Va.; 8 Canada; 8 St. Louis; 5 Okla.; 3 Buffalo; 3 N. Y.; 2 Kansas City; 2 Kentucky 1 Penna.; 1 Omaha; 1 Ohio; 1 Iowa; containing 4129 head, 175 head trucked in, total cattle 4304 head, 122 calves, 458 hogs, 778 sheep. Compared with previous week, cattle 134 cars, containing 3941 head, 213 head trucked in, total cattle 4154 head, 84 calves, 373 hogs, 793 sheep.

The wet weather has held up potato digging in both New Jersey and Virginia. As a result shipments have been lighter and prices have advanced sharply since the first of the week. The carlot market in Philadelphia was quiet with light offerings and limited trading. Most dealers were holding stock on hand in anticipation of higher prices. Small lots of Eastern Shore of Virginia Cobblers sold at \$2 to \$2.50 per barrel, while on the jobbing market the best New Jersey stock brought 60c to 70c per 5-8 basket, according to the Pennsylvania and Federal Bureau of Markets.

New Jersey Starr apples were steady at 75c to \$1.00 per 5-8 basket, while Williams Early Reds were quoted at 65c to \$1.00. Blackberries met a steady demand at \$3 to \$4 per 32 quart crate and huckleberries sold mostly at \$4 to \$6.00. The first New Jersey elderberries brought 75c to \$1.00 per 5-8 basket, and nearby Carman peaches jobbed at 65c to \$1.25.

New Jersey lima beans sold at \$1.40 to \$1.75 per 5-8 basket, with green beans selling mostly at \$1 to \$1.25. Cabbage was steady at 15c to 30c per 5-8 basket, while nearby sugar corn jobbed at \$1.00 to \$1.25 and yellow onions brought 75c to 80c. Tomatoes were weaker with early's selling at 40c to 60c per 5-8 basket, while second early's ranged from 75c to \$1.25. Long green squash sold at 40c to 60c per 5-8 basket, with white squash jobbing at 10c to 5c. Peppers were slightly weaker at 75c to 90c per 5-8 basket. Beets sold at 2c to 3c per bunch and beets brought 2c to 2 1/2c.

**CORN CROP LATE BUT LOOKS GOOD**

The corn crop in Lancaster county is about fifteen days later this season than last year, according to County Agent F. S. Bucher. The acreage this time is about the same as last year.

Corn is now beginning to tassel and some will be ready for market within the next two weeks, Mr. Bucher says. "We have some of the best looking corn in the county that I have ever seen," he says, "but because of the late season there will have to be excellent growing weather to make a normal crop."

Because of the lateness of the season a large number of farmers planted the Lancaster Sure Crop variety this year, which will mature within 108 days after planting. Most of the corn planted heretofore required about 135 days to mature.

**CROP INSURANCE FOR THE MANY GROWERS**

Some day we may be able to get crop insurance, just as we now can get life insurance. That is the opinion of Sir John Russell, Director of the Rothamsted Experiment Station in England, the oldest agricultural experiment station in the world. His station has been carrying on fertilizer experiments continuously on same land for 83 years. When such experiments are carried far enough, he said in a recent talk at the United States Department of Agriculture, it may be possible for an insurance company or a fertilizer concern to safely guarantee or insure farmers that if they use certain soil treatments they will get certain yields.

Kill Mexican Beetle  
Nearly all of the counties in the southern half of the state have been invaded by the Mexican bean beetle. Where only a few of these spotted beetles are found pull up the vines and burn them, being careful that the bugs are destroyed at the same time. If in doubt about the identity of the insect and when it is present in large numbers, notify the county agent who can suggest a means of control.

**PREPARING WHEAT FOR SEEDING**

This has become a very important factor these late years, if a marketable crop is desired when grain is harvested.
