### Community Chest Campaign In County

WILL BE INAUGURATED BY WELFARE FEDERATION OF LANCASTER IN CITY AND COUNTY NOV. 10 TO 14.

Information concerning the Welfare Federation of Lancaster which will inaugurate its Community Chest campaign for funds November 10 to 14th, in city and county. The Bulletin is co-operating by furnishing the reading public with facts and figures concerning this work. In order to further assist in the campaign this newspaper is also conducting a slogan contest in which prizes will be given for the best set of ten slogans or statements suitable for use on posters and banners and the like. After reading these articles, write out your ten slogans and have them in this office by October 31st. The prizes are ten dollars in gold, and the choice of the next four winners among the following: camera, sweater, leather pocketbook, electric lamp. The contest is open to anyone regardless of age; residence must be in Lancaster county.

### The Gift of Health

All social workers realize the important part that health plays in the lives of the people whom they serve. Behind nearly every story of failure, crime, and distress there is to be found a tale of broken health somewhere. Perhaps the father of a family lost his job because of poor health, became discouraged, deserted, or hung on as a hopeless invalid needing charitable help. Perhaps the mother's burden of house-keeping and caring for children was too great for her strength, and she broke down in body or in mind, leaving little ones to be cared for by others.

Most criminals are under par physically, or were not normally nourished in their early years when their characters were forming. And many little children today begin life with a wrong start through inherited defects or crippled conditions which, if set right while they are still in childhood, will change the whole course of their lives.

The Welfare Federation agencies which are supported wholly or in part by the Community Chest campaign each November, can be divided into two classes as far as health work is concerned—for they all work for better health in some way or other in the course of their daily routine. They either correct ill health in the community, or prevent it by education, wholesome recreation and sanitation.

The Hospitals Lancaster's three hospitals will depend upon the Community Chest in 1928 for their very existence. Even if there were no charity patients, or those who paid less than cost, the General Hospital, St. Joseph's Hospital, and Rossmere Sanitarium could not be maintained by paying patients at the rates now charged. These institutions are of recognized importance to the community, as well as of very necessary service to individuals.

Here are some figures of special interest to Lancaster county residents in this connection. The General Hospital last year cared for 4,301 patients, 1,957 of whom were county residents, and half of whom were free or less than cost patients. Almost \$75,000 was needed during that year from contributions, the remainder of the cost of maintaining the institution with its 85 nurses being made up from state appropriation, interest from the endowment fund, and the paying patients. Of the \$75,000 needed, about \$45,000 was contributed by Lancaster city residents and \$30,000 by county residents. Of the 64 towns outside of Lancaster from whom patients were admitted, Lititz had the greatest number, 137, and Ephrata was next with 133. There were 209 Lancaster R. F. D. residents admitted.

St. Joseph's hospital cared for 3,425 patients during the past 12 months, of whom 908 were county residents. This hospital also renders a large proportion of free and less than cost service, its children's ward, having been operated during the past year with 90 per cent of its patients free. St. Joseph's hospital is able to keep down its maintenance costs because of the valuable work rendered by the Sisters, without charge. The hospital is a new member of the Community Chest, and its budget for 1928 has not yet been announced by the Welfare Federation's Budget Committee.

Rossmere Sanitarium has a similar proportion of county cases—last year there were 41 from the city and 31 from the county, and there are at the present time 18 tuberculosis cases in the county under the personal supervision of the Sanitarium field nurse, Miss Edna Hoffa. Miss Hoffa does an extensive field work in Lancaster County, particularly with underweight school children, the most fertile field for the dangerous tuberculosis germ.

### Agencies Doing Health Work

Three more Community Chest agencies are definitely organized for health work in Lancaster city and county. The Visiting Nurses who last year made 4,546 visits in the county out of a total of 19,028, and who average 578 calls in the county every month, are the only field nurses doing actual bedside care in city or county. Their branches are now operating in all but the lower end of the county, where it is hoped to place a nurse with a car in the near future. At present, Miss Margie Ragle covers Columbia, Marietta and Mountville; Miss Myrtle Moyer has Elizabethtown, Mount Joy and Manheim; Miss Elizabeth Schriener is established in Lititz under the supervision of the Lancaster headquarters, and Miss Myrna Mackley is supported by the community of Ephrata, affiliated with the Lancaster office and covering Ephrata, Denver, Akron and Brownstown.
