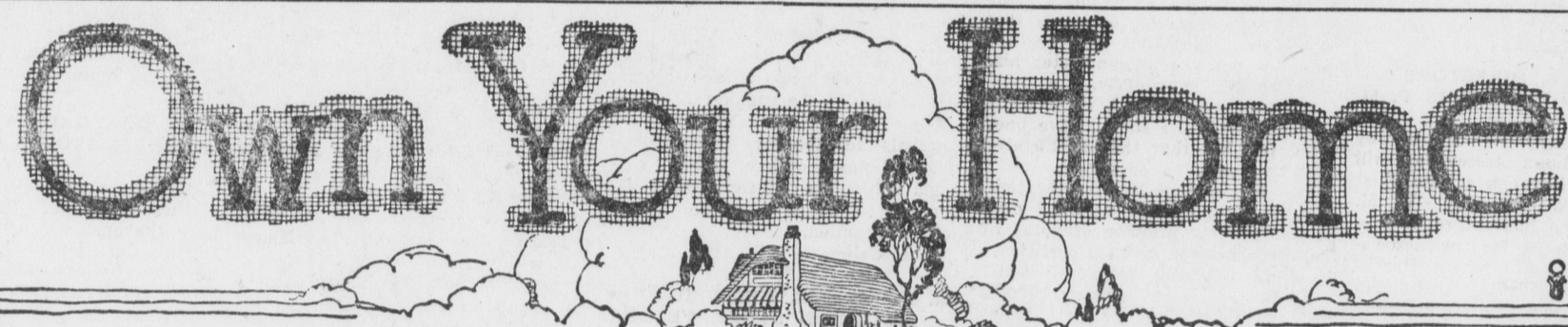
AGREE ON UNIFORM TYPES OF SIGNALS

The Department of Highways, the Public Service Commission and railroad companies have agreed upon the establishment of a uniform type of warning signals for all railroad grade crossings on the State highway system.
These light signals are track-circuited flashing signals, and where these are not clearly visible for a distance of at least 500 feet on the road and at all dangerous approaches to overhead and undergrade crossings of railroad tracks by State highways, there are to be provided continuously intermittently flashing beacon lights of the so-called "blinker" type.

SAFETY ON THE AMERICAN RAILROADS

On the Union Pacific record for 1927, a passenger could travel 2400 times around the earth before he would be in danger of an accident; and the average railroad worker would labor for 120 years to achieve only one accident.
The passenger record is the same as that of 1926; but there is a gain of 27 per cent in employe safety.
Not so very long ago, one seldom saw a middle aged trainman who had not lost at least part of hand; and the cemeteries were crowded with those who lost their lives. Nowadays, railroading is safer than banking; safer than almost any other kind of important work. Railroad travel is safer than staying at home or going to the movies.
