The Produce and Live Stock Market

CORRECT INFORMATION FURNISHED WEEKLY BY THE PENNA. BUREAU OF MARKETS FOR THE BULLETIN

The Philadelphia potato market was steady with a limited demand and moderate supplies. Pennsylvania round whites sold at \$2.65 to \$3.00 per 120 pound sack while Maine Green Mountains sold at \$3 to \$3.15. Idaho Russets sold at \$2.75 per 100 pound sack, according to the Pennsylvania and Federal Bureau of Markets.

Dandelion greens were in lighter supply and sold at 65c to \$1.00 per bushel while kale brought 50c to 75c. Homegrown carrots were stronger and sold at 75c to \$1.25 per 5-8 basket. Kale sold at 50c to 75c per bushel while the best spinach brought 75c to \$1.25. The mushroom market was slightly weaker with prices ranging from 40c to \$1.15 per 3 pound basket. Pennsylvania parsley sold at 3c a bunch, rhubarb at 4c and 5c and scallions at 75c to \$1.25 per 100 bunches.

The sweet potato market was draggy with prices ranging from \$1.10 to \$1.50 per 5-8 basket. Apples met a good demand with the best Rome, Staymen and Paragon selling at \$2.75 to \$3.25.

MARKET: Beef steers, fairly active, early week's decline fully absorbed, closing steady with weight ago, top -13.50, average weight 1310, 1270 pound averages \$13.25, bulk of sales \$11.50-12.50. Bulls, she stock and all cutters steady, bulk medium bulls \$8.50-9.75. Heifers \$10.00-11.00, butcher cows \$7.50-8.50, cutters \$4.50-5.50. Stockers and feeders slow, fully steady. Calves steady at week's decline, top vealers \$16.00.

HOGS: Strong to 50c higher, top locals \$10.50, no westerns on sales. RECEIPTS: For today's market, cattle 3 cars, 1 St. Paul; 1 Chicago; 1 Penna.; containing 91 head, 515 head trucked in from local feed lots, total cattle 606 head, 27 calves, 202 hogs, 12 sheep. Receipts for week ending April 21, 1928, cattle 25 cars, 20 Penna.; 2 Del; 1 St. Paul; 1 Chicago; 1 Buffalo, containing 604 head, 1235 trucked in, total cattle 1839 head, 425 calves, 1241 hogs, 47 sheep. Receipts for corresponding week last year, cattle 21 cars, 17 Penna.; 2 St. Paul; 1 Chicago; 1 Tenn.; containing 460 head, 928 head trucked in, total cattle 1394 head, 167 calves, 239 hogs.

Middletown — Rebuilding of Marietta Pike on north side of Chickies Hill in progress.

Conestoga — Keystone Automobile Club erects numerous direction and warning signs in southern Chester County.

Lewistown — Bids opened for construction of new Elks' building on site of present home.

St. Thomas — Reservoir constructed in public square to be used for storage of water for fire protection here.

Mercersburg — Autocaster installed in "journal" plant.

Lewistown — Reedsville National Bank will construct new building in near future.

Wilkesbarre — Plans approved for construction of steel-concrete grandstand and locker room at Graham Field.

Weatherly — Borough streets improved and repaired.

Hazleton — \$100,000 bond issue for construction of airport will be voted on here, April 24th.

Carbondale — Lackawanna Motor Club install automobile headlight reflector at intersection of Canaan and Belmont Streets.

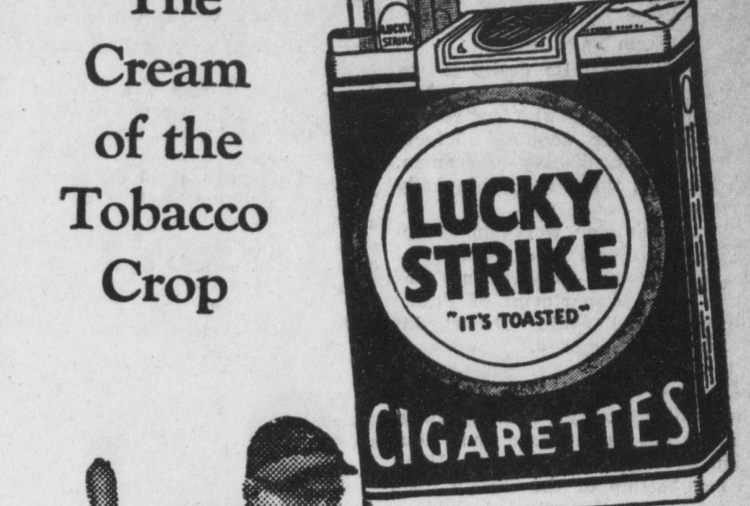
Scranton — \$20,000 contract awarded for construction of apartment building at Luzerne Street and 20th Avenue.

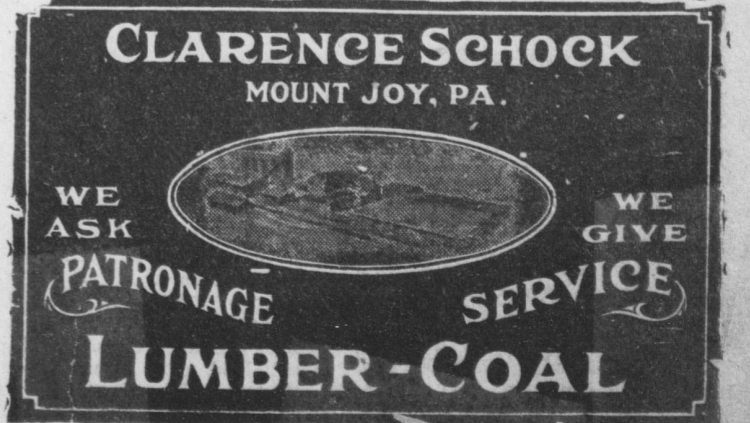
