Bill In Equity Against George Brown's Sons

(From Page One) 2. That title to the said land vested in your Orator by certain conveyances from J. Lehman Swarr, Jr., and wife, dated December 11, 1926, and recorded in the Recorder's Office at Lancaster, Pa., in Deed Book H, Volume 28 at Page 557, and by Deed from Eli H. Engle, dated December 8th, 1926, and recorded in the Recorder's Office at Lancaster, Pa., in Deed Book H, Volume 28 at Page 578; by Deed of Eli H. Engle and Clayton Hoffman, dated December 8th, 1926, and recorded in the Recorder's Office at Lancaster, Pa., in Deed Book H, Volume 28, at Page 579, and by Deed of John E. Longenecker and wife, dated December 11th, 1926, and recorded in the Recorder's Office at Lancaster, Pa., in Deed Book H, Volume 28 at Page 580.

3. That George Brown's Sons, Inc., the Defendant, is a corporation, incorporated under the laws of Pennsylvania, whose Charter is dated January 30th, 1919, and was recorded in the Recorder's Office at Lancaster, Pa., on December 30th, 1920, in Charter Book No. 4 at Page 456; that said George Brown's Sons, Inc., is doing business in the Borough of Mount Joy, Pennsylvania, and was at and before the time of the trespass hereinafter alleged, and now is the owner of a certain cotton mill, and tract of land, upon which the same is erected, which land and cotton mill is situated on Main Street, in the Borough of Mount Joy, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, adjoining lands of your Orator.

4. That on said tract of land owned by your Orator there are four excellent springs of pure, wholesome water, which for a period of over fifty years have been used by the owners and the inhabitants close by, as a source of supply for domestic purposes; that the main spring at the residence on said tract of ground is the source of supply of water for your Orator and his family needs; that to protect said spring your Orator constructed four concrete walls; 16 feet long, 12 feet wide and four feet high, and from said spring he and his family and neighbors prior to March 26th, 1928, obtained pure, wholesome water for domestic and drinking purposes, and your Orator has no other source of supply of water for domestic or drinking purposes.

5. That the defendant on or about March 26th, 1928, on its property in the Borough of Mount Joy, dug a sink or hole to carry off the dye water after its use in their Mill, which said dye water was injurious, deleterious, poisonous and obnoxious.

6. That by reason of the said Defendant digging said sink and emptying into said sink the dye water from its Cotton Mill the said water, which was injurious, deleterious, poisonous and obnoxious percolated into the aforesaid springs of the Plaintiff whereby the water of the said springs, which had theretofore been pure and wholesome was polluted and defiled, and rendered unhealthful, noxious, dangerous and unfit for domestic use.

7. That said springs of the Plaintiff are located within 100 feet of the Little Chickies Creek, a public stream or tributary, and said waters of said springs contaminated by the dyes from the Cotton Mill of the Defendant flows into said public stream or tributary and contaminates the water of said public stream or tributary by discoloration and injurious, deleterious, poisonous and obnoxious foreign matters. The water of said springs, which formerly was pure and sparkling, is now impure and black in color.

8. Wherefore, your Orator having shown that the said Defendant has polluted the water of his springs by rendering them unfit and dangerous for domestic use, and depriving him of their use, whereby irreparable injury is done, and your Orator is without relief and prays:—

(1) That the said George Brown's Sons, Inc., the above named Defendant, their servants, agents, employees and each of them, be enjoined * * * from emptying dye water into said sink on their premises, in the Borough of Mount Joy, Lancaster County, Pa., and that on final hearing the said Defendant, their servants, agents, employees and each of them, may be perpetually enjoined as aforesaid.

(2) That the Defendant above named be ordered and directed to fill up said sink and to repair and restore the said springs of your Orator to their original condition.

(3) That such other and further relief as to your Honorable Court may seem equitable and proper.

The above case will be heard in Court at the June session.

Didn't Close Plant

The plaintiff, Mr. Schroll, had contemplated filing an injunction. This would have closed the plant and thrown the employees out of work for a month or six weeks. Having too much consideration for those employed by this firm, the injunction was not filed. The employees, who were only working three days a week for some time (except the last two weeks) will be able to continue until the court's decision in the matter.
