SPEAKERS AND RECEIVERS

A new line of Radiolas including uperheterodyne receivers utilizing AC radiotrons throughout, for simp lified electric operation with self-enclosed loudspeakers of the improved dynamic type, and a new loudspeaker of artistic design, is announced by the Radio Corporation

Pointing out that 'years of intensive research and nstant development by the leading radio organizations have served to confirm the soundness of basic principles represented in the superheterodyne circuit," the announcement reads, "Now, with the application of AC tubes to the superhetero-dyne circuit, following the example set with the improved tuned radiofrequency circuit, broadcast reception takes another step forward to-

The new AC superheterodyne receivers are introduced in three models to be known as Radiola 60, popular priced table model, Radiola 62, a console cabinet with enclosed dynamic speaker and Radiola 64, a larger console cabinet with a dynamic speaker of greater power.
