Give the Clover a Chance

If red clover seeded last spring is used for pasture this fall, it should not be too closely grazed, or next season's hay crop may be decreased. The planting should be allowed to go into the winter with some growth on the crown.

A good fattening ration for the poultry may be made of 6 parts, by weight, of corn meal, 2 parts of ground oats (without hulls), and 2 parts of middlings, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Mix this ration with milk, using 2 pounds to 1 pound of milk.

The best quality of meat can be obtained from a hog that is in good flesh and in a thrifty condition. Overfished hogs produce fatter hams, bacon and other cuts than the average family desires.

As a result, blight killed the vines which did not receive any spray except that which drifted and settled on them.

653 STATE DAIRYMEN GET NATIONAL HONOR

Six hundred and fifty-three owners of dairy herds in 57 Pennsylvania cow testing associations will be honored at the National Dairy Exposition in Memphis, Tenn., October 13 to 20, E. B. Fitts, in charge of dairy extension work at the Pennsylvania State College, announces. The associations are located in 42 counties of the state. The owners will receive honor certificates in recognition of an average production of more than 800 pounds of butterfat per cow in their herds during the year ending July 1. There will be a personal presentation at all herd owners attending the exposition, while those who do not attend will receive their awards at a later date through their county agricultural extension association.

Among the counties, Mercer leads with 51 herds. Bradford is second with 41 herds. Tioga third with 37 herds. Chester fourth with 35 herds, and Cumberland, Sullivan and Union tie for fifth place with 2 herds each. In individual associations, the Union and Cumberland groups tie for first with 23 herds each. Butler and Grove City associations tie for second with 20 herds each. Canton and Jefferson county associations are in third place with 18 herds each, and Wayne county association is fourth with 15 herds.
