The secretary reported a refund from the State Workmen's Insurance Dept. of \$33.16 on last year's insurance.

A report from the State Board of Health showed that a recent analysis of our Boro water supply showed a slight contamination. The Department recommended that our chlorinating outfit be looked after in order that our water may be kept as near pure as possible. The Rev. Geo. Kercher report stated that the contamination came from sewerage.
