STATE AID HIT BY SUPERVISORS

 "To pay for not only maintenance, but occasional new construction, they collect between \$10,000,000, and \$15,000,000 road taxes each year. This is a trifle more than half what the State Highway Department annually allocates to maintenance of 13,000 miles of road. In other words, supervisors must do nearly six times the work with half what the Highway Department spends for maintenance alone, or six times the work with only a fifth as much money as the Highway Department spends for all purposes."
 "For ten years the State has been building main thoroughfares, calculated to benefit through traffic. A traffic census will show that the great proportion of traffic is purely local," he continued. "It occurs to us, therefore, that it is time something be done to lift rural Pennsylvania out of the mud. Sixty per cent of Pennsylvania's farms are marooned by the mud, seven months each year. What this costs the balance of the population in the increased cost of produce from the farms I leave to the imagination of the consumer."

BIRTHDAY DINNER FOR C. K. WEAVER



 was carrying a small flashlight in his hand as a precaution against being struck in the manner in which he was killed. Apparently mistaking the light for that of a motorcycle, Martin in reporting the accident to State Highway Patrolman Goldstein, said he expected what he supposed to be a vehicle to swerve to the opposite side of the road out of his way.
 Poff was struck by the fender of the car, and was tossed to one side. He was picked up by Martin and rushed to St. Joseph's hospital. After an examination it was disclosed that the right side of Poff's chest was crushed, most of the ribs being broken. He also suffered internal injuries, a broken leg and numerous cuts about the body.
 Patrolman Goldstein is making an investigation and Mr. Martin was released on his own recognizance.
 Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, at the late home, and burial was made in Landisville cemetery.
 Mr. Poff was in his forty-third year. He was sexton of the Landisville cemetery for twelve years and was employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad company.
 He is survived by his wife, who before marriage was Edna Tate; three sons, John, Sylvester and Claire, all at home; and these brothers and sisters: Mrs. Clara Shupp, of Oyster Point; Mrs. Cora Lumm, of Wrightsville; David Poff, of Mechanicsburg, Lancaster Co.; George, of East Prospect, York County; Robert, of York; Paul, of Yorkanna, and Mrs. Grace Hilt, of Wrightsville.
