Wisconsin Yields Gum Like Irish Peat Wax Bank.

Washington.-Wax similar to that extractable from Irish peat has been produced in peat bogs of Wisconsin as on the Donegal Road leading to the result of experiments conducted by Cross Roads Church, at the end of the bureau of mines. In the course of studies of the ori-

This wax apparently is very similar to wax extractable from Irish peat. It is quite different chemically from the wax recoverable from low-temperature tar, because this consists mainly of hydrocarbons.

Uncle Sam's Private Fox Farm Yields 586 Pelts

Dutch Harbor, Alaska.-Uncle Sam has a fox ranch all his own. A total of 552 blue fox skins and 34 white ones were taken from animals trapped on the Pribilof islands during the season of 1928-29, as compared with 901 the previous period.

These island foxes live on the carcasses of fur seals killed for their pelts during late summer. The early winter frosts preserve the meat until the following June. Then for three months foxes subsist on sea food combed from the beaches.
