Radio Idea Old

Radio communication is not an invention, nor in reality a discovery. The theory was known long before anybody was able to apply it in practice. Numerous inventors were trying to devise apparatus that would make the theory work. For this reason, several different practical systems of wireless telegraphy appeared about the same time. Marconi had the good fortune to be first, but he distanced his nearest competitors by only a short time. It was only by aceident that electrical communication by wire was perfected before electrical communication without wires, as both are implied in the electrical knowledge that preceded them, and inventors were working in both fields for many years before anybody in either group succeeded.

Humors Are Hormones Another belief of the old-time doctors has been upheld. What they called "humors" in the blood has proved to be the modern "hormones" which are secreted from certain ductless glands and not from the heart and liver as once believed. The oldtime dotors claimed the disposition of their patients and some of their ills were due to these "humors."
