WHEAT ONLY ABOUT TWO-THIRD CROP THIS YEAR

With a number of wheat crons already threshed and marketed, one of the best looking wheat stands ever produced in this territory is only about a twothird crop.

One farmer's yield was sixteen bushels to the acre while the highest yield reported thus far is twenty-five bushels.

The grains are very light but there is an abundance of straw. This is largely due, an experienced wheat grower tells us, to the continued drought while the wheat grains were maturing.

RAN A CONSIDERABLE DIS-TANCE TO SUMMON FIRE-MEN WHEN FLAMES THREATENED HIES-TAND HOME.

Elizabeth Canna, 14 years old, Tennessee girl, befriended and given a home sometime ago by Mr. and Mrs. Christ Heistand, of near Locust Grove, raced more than a quarter of a mile through a scorching sun early today and summoned firemen who saved the property of her foster parents when fire started in a small wash house.

Fire started in a pile of papers near a wood stove in which Mrs. Heistand had started a fire to heat water shortly after 8 o'clock. Mrs. Heistand, who discovered the blaze, expressed the belief that sparks, from the blazing wood had fallen either from the stove pipe or an open draught door.

Mrs. Heistand first attempted to battle the fire alone, but it spread rapidly to the dry framework of the little building and she was forced to retreat before the intense heat,
