Semi-annual payments of subsidy to fourth class rural school districts in the form of checks totaling \$193,-424.76 were mailed into Lancaster Co. last week, it was announced by Statetreasurer Edward Martin.

The check for the Lancaster city school district will be sent September 1, when second-class and third-class districts will be paid.

The payments to the districts represent a percentage of each teacher's salary. Districts which have closed one-room school buildings because of decreased attendance and have sent pupils to other schools get an added allowance of \$200 per year for each school closed
