Extended Stay Here It was just by chance that Matilda went into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Myers, Mount Joy. She was bright blue-eyed youngster with silken blonde hair. She responded quickly to the comforts of a Lancaster County home and when the two weeks expired she asked permission to remain two weeks more. The children of the Myers family are grown and married and the couple welcomed the prolonged visit of their little guest. They bought her clothing and fed her nourishing food.

Two more weeks passed and the task of returning home became more difficult. Then Mrs. Levy entered the picture and permitted her child to remain for several months. Then, according to Mrs. Myers, the New York woman took her child and after three weeks returned her with the explanation that "My baby is dying in New York, please take care of her."

Again Matilda was welcomed to the Myers home and in September 1926 the foster parents entered into an agreement that the child should remain in their home for one year with the understanding that she could not be adopted. Immediately the family prepared to care for their foster daughter. They clad her in fine clothing, sent her to school and church and set aside a fund with which to educate her after she had completed the grammar and High schools of the boro.

Mother Demands Child Shortly before the expiration of the agreement Mrs. Levy, the Myers family said, came and demanded her daughter. Her request was refused because the child was in the midst of her school term. Then Mrs. Levy, according to the Myers family came and demanded her daughter and, according to testimony, was ordered "never to darken the door of the Myers home again." She didn't but she resorted to law.

The case was one of the most dramatic in court records, according to men who have worked around the Court House for generations. Mrs. Levy, excited and emphatic, told over and over again "I came for my baby and they would not give her to me. After I signed the agreement I was heart sick and I want my baby."

Matilda listened attentively, glancing from her foster mother to her foster father as she sat between them at the counsel table. K. L. Shirk attorney for the Myers family who was an outstanding figure in bringing the fresh air children to Lancaster, fought a hard battle, but Judge Landis was firm that the law must have its course and that the plea of Mrs. Levy was the plea of the mother.

Poor New York Family Attorney Shirk attempted to introduce Marguerite Levy, an older daughter, who hurried from New York city last night in an effort to prevent her mother from obtaining custody of her younger sister. On the stand Mrs. Levy testified that she lives in three rooms on the ground floor of a big New York apartment and admitted she had a male roomer. Once during the testimony an effort was made to show that Mrs. Levy drinks and came here on one or more occasions in an intoxicated condition.

The excitable New York woman leaped to her feet and wildly waved her arms and screamed: "I swear on the ashes of my dead mother that I have never touched a drop of liquor." The attempt to introduce the testimony unswayed the woman and time again she leaped to her feet and waved her arms to add emphasis. Mrs. Levy was apparently deaf and attorneys were compelled to speak in loud terms as the drama neared its climax.

There was a long conference before the bar and then Judge Landis ruled that the child belonged to the mother. Marguerite hurried across the court room to comfort Matilda as she started crying. Tightly clasping her older sister around the waist Matilda took a seat in the court room until attendants asked her to leave because it was time to close the room.

Pleas to Remain In the corridor Mrs. Levy was waiting. She took hold of Matilda but the child broke away and ran to the nearest court attendant. "Please tell me where the judge is," she pleaded. "I want to tell him I can't go back to that terrible filth without any food. Please can't you tell him, maybe he'll talk to me."

In another room dealing with other boys and girls, Judge Landis was busy. Court attendants attempted to quiet the child and when Marguerite came to their assistance she was roughly pushed away by her mother, with the court order.

"Keep out of this." Scores of attorneys and court house employees called words of encouragement to the child as she was led out the rear entrance.
