begin to investigate the why and how of it, to punish any negligence that might be discovered and to make sure that such a tragedy would not happen again...

Thus, while the death of 12 children in a single accident would stir us profoundly, we do not even realize that that many youngsters are killed every day of the year by traffic accidents in United States...

During the past year, nearly 5,000 children under 15 years of age were killed in traffic. In addition, children under that age were injured at the rate of more than 400 a day...

And yet the nation accepts the situation placidly. There isn't much of an outcry about it. We don't have city and state commissions holding meetings to see where the blame lies. At the very most, we only caution our youngsters not to play in the streets and to be careful at crossings...

Perhaps if we could see the details of these accidents more closely we would be more aroused by them...

Picture your own lad, for instance. He's playing with a ball. It rolls out into the street; and with a laugh, he darts out after it. Of course, being just a kid, he does not stop to look; so he doesn't see the auto that is coming too fast to stop. And that's the end of him...

Or perhaps he's going to the corner store to get a package of groceries; clutching his money tightly in a grubby fist, his face serious and proud because he has been given a grown-up job to do. He gets to a corner. It looks safe, and he starts out. But out of nowhere comes a truck he didn't see—and, after one frightened little scream, it's all over...

Picture that; then stop and consider that it happens, on an average more than 12 times every day of the year in this country that prides itself on being good to its children. Add to it the fact that 400 more children are hit each day and sent to the hospital—some of them never to walk and play again. And then ask yourself if it isn't time something very drastic was done...

It may be that we shall have to spend many millions of dollars to remake all of our residence districts, so that traffic can be routed around them. It is certain we shall have to spend millions to provide more play spaces for the kids, so that they won't ever have to play on or beside the streets. It may be that we shall have to put unheard-of restrictions on traffic in residential neighborhoods...

Whatever the solution may be, it is past time that we found out. Here is a problem that must be tackled without any further delay. And the causes must be removed, no matter how much it may cost. The lives of 5,000 children a year are too high a price to pay for the use of automobiles...
