UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT RULES THAT PUR-CHASERS CAN'T BE HELD FOR CON-SPIRACY

Bootleggers' customers cannot be punished under the prohibition law, in the opinion of the United States Circuit. Court of Appeals. In a decision Thursday in the

case of Alfred E. Norris, New York broker and clubman, the appellate court held that to buy liquor and and even arrange for its delivery, as Mr. Norris did. was not punishable as a "conspiracy to transport intoxicants" or otherwise actionable under Federal law.

The decision reversed Federal District Judge William H. Kirkpatrick, who agreed with the contention of prohibition authorities that buyers of liquor might be prosecuted for "conspiracy" where (Turn to page 5)

AN ESSAY CONTEST ON MOUNT JOY'S LIBRARY

The English Departments of both the Senior and Junior High schools have instituted an Essay Contest on the question :--- "Can Mount Joy Aford to be Without a Public Library?"




