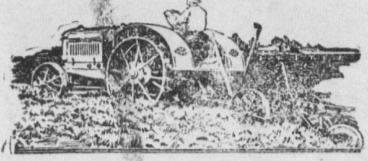

Before one of the largest crowds to witness a foot ball game here in years, Mount Joy's eleven won the best game of the season here Sunday afternoon when they trounced the Harrisburg Professionals 14 to 6.

HEALTH TALK WRITTEN BY DR. THEODORE B. APPEL, SECRETARY OF HEALTH

"During the so-called 'hex' murder trial some months ago much scorn was pointed at the ignorance which was responsible for the crime. It so happened, however, that many of those who were deriding the situation were not quite so intelligent as they considered themselves to be," said Dr. Theodore B. Appel, Secretary of Health, today.

"There are yet many superstitions which in quality, if not in intensity, are just as bad as is the 'hex' idea. And to make matters worse, there is not the excuse of ignorance to support them. Indeed, these misconceptions are harbored by thousands who have education and sound reasoning power.

"For example, many thousands of parents are still of the opinion that whooping cough, measles and other 'catching diseases' should be caught early and thus be done with; that cancer is a communicable disease; that tuberculosis is an inherited malady; and that tonics can effectively supplant the physical necessities of fresh air, proper food, adequate sleep and daily exercise.

"As a matter of fact, the childhood diseases should be guarded against with the utmost caution. They kill thousands of little people each year. Again, while cancer is not a communicable disease and carries no personal stigma of any kind, early diagnosis of probable symptoms such as lumps, unusual bleeding and persistent sores should be made by a physician. Many lives can thus be saved. Tuberculosis also needs early discovery for favorable results. Therefore, a persistent cough or a consistent loss of weight should promptly be investigated. And finally, the basic living laws need to be carefully and regularly followed if life is to attain its highest degree of vigor and vitality.

"If you are so inclined, poke fun at unfortunate ignorance. But in the first place turn the light upon yourself to make sure that it is not also playing devilizing tricks on you. Get out of the 'hex' class before pitying 'hexers.'"

ELECTION NOTICE Notice is hereby given that at the General Election to be held on November 5, 1929, the questions stated in the ordinances below set forth will be submitted for the approval or rejection of the electors of Mount Joy Borough.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE ELECTORS OF THE BOROUGH OF MOUNT JOY OF THE QUESTION WHETHER THE BOROUGH SHALL APPROPRIATE MONEYS FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF A FREE, NON-SECTARIAN, PUBLIC LIBRARY.

WHEREAS, Henry G. Reist, has declared his intention to establish a free, non-sectarian, public library in the Borough of Mount Joy, and has requested that the Borough provide for the maintenance thereof:

1. Be it ordained by the Council of the Borough of Mount Joy that the question hereinafter set forth shall be submitted to the electors of the Borough at the regular election to be held by the regular election officers at the usual hours and places for holding general elections in the Borough on Tuesday, the fifth day of November, A. D. Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-nine.

2. The question to be submitted to the electors at the election aforesaid shall be as follows: "Shall the Council of the Borough of Mount Joy make an annual appropriation not to exceed an amount equal to two mills on the dollar of all taxable property in the Borough, for the maintenance or for aid in the maintenance of a free, non-sectarian, public library to be established in the said Borough by deed or gift of Henry G. Reist, the Borough to be represented by at least two members on the board having control of the affairs of such library?"

3. The Clerk of Council shall cause notice of said election, embodying this ordinance therein, to be published in the Mount Joy Bulletin once a week for thirty days prior to said election and to post during said time, at least twenty printed like notices in public-places in the Borough.

Enacted and ordered by Council this 8th day of A. D. 1929.
