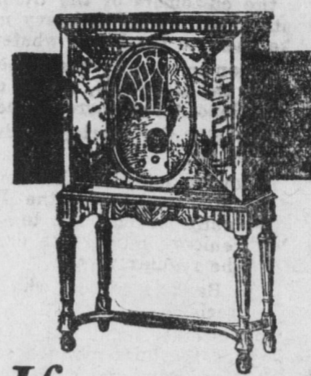
LANDISVILLE
