U. S. AND AUSTRALIA TALK BY TELEPHONE IN DEMONSTRATION

A. T. & T. Co. Officials Exchange Greetings With Communication Experts in Sydney.

America talked to Australia through regular telephones for the first time recently when officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company exchanged greetings with Australian telephone officials in Sydney.

The occasion was the informal demonstration of the practicability of connecting the trans-Atlantic telephone channel operated by the A. T. & T. Co. and the British Postoffice with the new short wave radio telephone channel operated by the British Government Postoffice between Great Britain and the Australian continent, that soon may be opened for commercial use.

The short wave trans-Atlantic radio channel now in regular use for European service was utilized in the demonstration, permitting the voices of the speakers to be carried approximately 15,000 miles by the short wave systems of the United States and Australia.

From New York, the calls passed over wire lines to the company's transmitting center at Lawrenceville, N. J., thence by radio to Baldock, near London, then by wire to the British government's transmitting station at Rugby, and again by radio to Australia.

An interesting aspect of the conversations was that while they took place at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, New York time, clocks in Sydney read 6 A. M. the next day.

Trans-Atlantic telephone service to European countries constantly is being extended, the most recent additions including all points in Czechoslovakia and to Turin and Genoa, Italy. With the extension of the service to Genoa, the birthplace of Columbus was provided with direct telephone communication with the continent he discovered. Following his discovery, two months were required to carry the news to his home. Today the human voice travels the same distance in a fraction of a second.

On November 6, trans-Atlantic telephone service was extended to all points in Austria. For the last year it had been available to Vienna.

A Dollar Dinner For Four

Vegetable Soup 10
Southern Sausages 30
Sautéed Spinach 10
Rolls and butter 10
Peach Surprise 28
Coffee .05
Total \$0.93

WITH the above account on view, who can deny that by the aid of careful shopping and taking advantage of food sales a delicious meal can be prepared for four adults for one dollar?

The can of vegetable soup needs only to have water added and to be heated before serving, and the can of spinach may be sautéed and seasoned with celery salt and onion salt and served.

To prepare the sausages, sauté two sliced onions in two tablespoons of butter until golden brown. Add one number 2½ can of tomatoes and bring to boiling; add salt and pepper to taste. Add one-fourth cup rice and cook gently until rice is tender. Add contents of a 9 ounce can of Vienna sausages and heat through.

For the peach surprise eight peach halves from a can are needed. Chop two tablespoons figs and two tablespoons pecans and mix, using enough evaporated milk to bind together. The seven cents left from your dollar will cover the cost of these. Place the peach halves together, filling the holes with the fig and pecan mixture. Place in sherbet glasses and top with whipped, evaporated milk. To whip the milk, put the can into water, heat to the boiling point, then chill rapidly, then whip. Serve immediately.

Flavor-Sealed Ham

Flavor-Sealed Ham

Did you know you could buy a ham with the flavor sealed in it? "How?" you ask. Why just go to your dealers and pick out a selected, mildly cured ham which is vacuum cooked and sterilized in its own can. All its juices are sealed in and the ham is delivered to you fresh, flavorful and tender. The skin and bone and other waste are all removed. To serve whole, simply pop into the oven and brown. For medium sized families the whole ham weighing six to ten pounds and which will bake in sixty minutes may be purchased. Smaller families will prefer the three to five-pound can of ham which will bake in thirty minutes.

Toothsome Uses

Everyone knows the usual ways of using ham, in sandwiches, cold with salads, baked, fried, with eggs, and so on, but there are other methods which are just as delectable and more unusual.

For instance, cut one or two inch-thick slices of ham and brown in a little fat in the baking pan. Pour crushed pineapple over the ham and add one-half cup water. Bake slowly until tender. Remove to hot platter and pour hot pineapple syrup around it.

Tomatoes stuffed with ham are delicious. Remove a thin slice from the top of each tomato and remove seeds and pulp. Run canned ham through the meat grinder and mix with half as much bread crumbs and the tomato pulp and pepper and salt. Stuff tomatoes with this mixture, cover with buttered crumbs and bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven.

Celery and ham may be creamed together and served on toast, garnished with minced parsley.

5385 YEARS OF SERVICE FOR 187 BELL EMPLOYEES

Telephone Company's Assistant Auditor Is Dean of Veteran Anniversarians.

What is believed to be a record in this State for continuous service in one industry has been established by 187 employees of The Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, who this year are observing service anniversaries of 25 to 55 years inclusive.

This group, comprised of men and women who have had prominent parts in the company's vast program designed to provide the best possible communication network, has a total of 5385 years of service.

The dean of the veterans is William J. McLaughlin, assistant auditor, with 55 years of service.

Three men are observing their 50th anniversaries, five others have been connected with the industry for 48 years each, and six have 40 years of service. Sixteen employees boast of 35-year careers, 51 have been employed for 30 consecutive years and 105 have been engaged in telephone work for 25 years.

BELL COMPANY ADDS 65,000 TELEPHONES TO PENNA. NETWORK

Gain for Ten Months in 1929 is 51 P. C. Greater Than Average of Last Five Years.

With an increase of approximately 65,000 instruments during the first ten months of 1929, the number of Bell telephones in operation in this State has grown more rapidly this year than during any previous year in the history of the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, according to Leonard H. Kinnard, president.

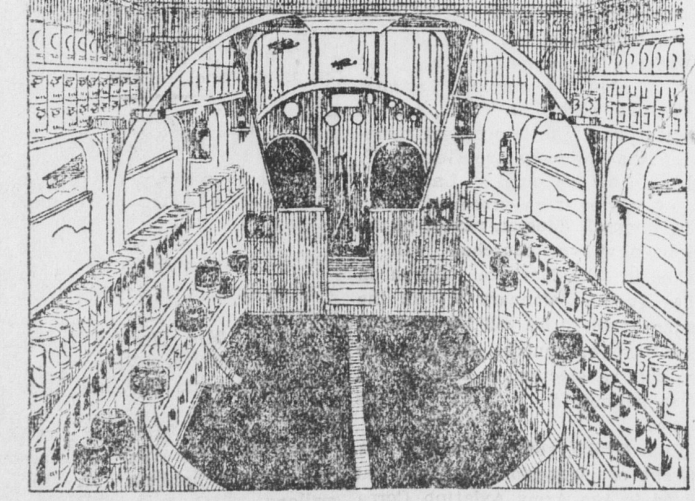
This increase is more than 51 per cent. greater than the average for the corresponding period during the preceding five years.

There now are more than 1,200,000 Bell telephones in service in Pennsylvania, as compared with about 600,000 in the year 1919.

Today nearly half a million homes and business establishments in the State may be reached by telephone which a decade ago could be reached only by messenger or by a personal visit, indicating the increasing value in convenience and time-saving which the service provides.

Now the Flying Grocery



ALMOST everything has taken to flying, but it comes as a surprise to hear that even a grocery can now be found zooming around in the empyrean. Yet this modern version of the distribution of goods is showing if not showering of money has recently become an accomplished fact.

Manna from the Sky

One of the large manufacturers and distributors of canned foods has fitted out a tri-motored plane with a complete line of his products and is sending this flying grocery to every air port in the country. Salesmen accompany the ship to describe the contents to retailers at the various towns. Nothing is sold from this grocery, but the permanent shelves in the cabin hold a display of pickles, preserves, tea and coffee and a full line of canned vegetables and fruits. Comfortable seats are arranged in the plane for passengers, and large windows allow a view of the country over which the airplane passes.

The airplane is the latest model Ford all-metal monoplane. According to "Canning Age," it is "a duplicate in design of the airplane used by the Transcontinental Air Transport as a 'flying office' for Colonel Lindbergh and Colonel Lamplighter, that used by Mrs. Lindbergh in her trip to Mexico in 1927, and of the plane now in use with Byrd's Antarctic Expedition."

While this flying grocery is not designed for selling, but rather for the display of foods, who knows how long it will be before airplanes will be bringing groceries to out-of-the-way communities at regular intervals? The rapid advances in aviation bring this well within the realm of possibility.
