SERVICE WAS HELD HERE DR. SCHLOSSER ACCEPTS POST

NAMED PRESIDENT OF ELIZA-BETHTOWN COLLEGE FOR A THREE YEAR TERM.

Dr. Ralph Weist Schlosser, of Elizabethtown, has accepted the presidency of Elizabethtown College for a term of not less than three years. It is the first time in the history of the institution that a president has been elected for more than one year. The official announcement was made shortly before noon by Rev. Samuel H. Hertzler, president of the Board

Dr. Schlosser has served at the college for about 15 years in various capacities, including the presidency, which he resigned to continue his academic work. The new president now is attending Columbia University. He will take charge of the school at the beginning of the 1930-1931 term but will arrange details of his administration in the meantime and help select his faculty.
