Prior to 1840 the use of machinery in the cracker-making process was practically unknown. Even then the dough was still worked up and put into the oven one piece at a time. Machinery was finally invented which took the dough after it had been prepared by hand and rolled it into a thin sheet which, as it passed over a sort of endless belt, was cut by a stamping machine which works automatically.

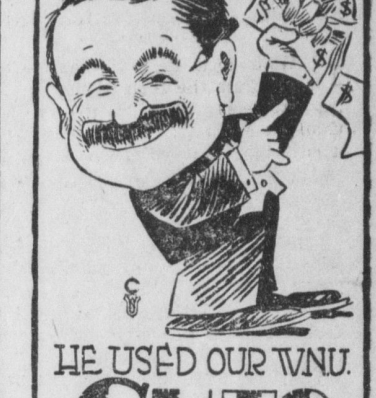

The tests this year included acceleration, speed, brakes, front wheel shimmy, steering action, "boiled," slowest speed before and after the speed tests, vibration, jerking, economy and reliability.
