Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to a resolution of the Council of the Borough of Mount Joy, an election will be held in said Borough at the regular polling places therein for the holding of general and municipal elections, on Tuesday, November 4, 1930, between the hours of 7 A. M. and 7 P. M. for the purpose of voting upon a proposed increase of the indebtedness of the Borough by the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00). The amount of the last assessed valuation of taxable property in the said Borough for county purposes for the year 1929 is \$1,400,720.00. The existing debt of the said Borough is \$25,000. The amount of this proposed increase of indebtedness is Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00), and the percentage is .04% of the last assessed valuation.

The purpose for which the proposed increase of indebtedness is to be made is the construction of a water filtration plant and for other improvements to the Borough water system. Witness my hand. JAC. H. ZELLER, Secretary of Council

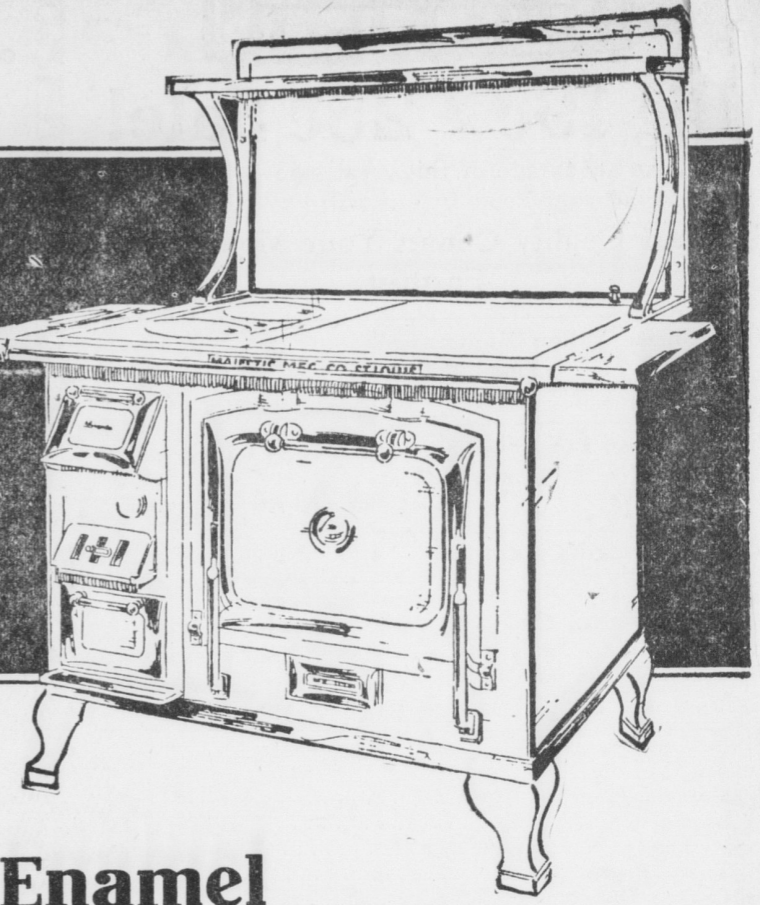
COTTON MILL DEFEATS THE TONSORIAL ARTISTS
