1929 TOBACCO IS MOVING SLOWLY

6,000 CASES SOLD LAST WEEK AT PRICES RANGING FROM 18c TO 25c POUND

Approximately 6,000 cases of Lancaster county's 1929 tobacco crop has passed from the hands of farmers and packers to manufacturers during the past week or ten days, it was estimated today. Prices range all the way from 18 to 25 cents a pound. It is estimated that approximately 29,000 cases of the 1929 tobacco crop are still in the hands of farmers and dealers. The present buying of tobacco is described as largely a speculative movement.

Dealers located at New Holland, Mt. Joy, Litz, Landisville and Elizabethtown are reported to have sold their 1929 tobacco. Some of the purchases were made by the General Cigar Company through (turn to page 5)

1 1/2 YEARS AND \$200 FINE AND COSTS FOR COOVER

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HALL ASSO. MET HERE ON MONDAY

FOUR PERCENT DIVIDEND DECLARED AND \$200 BONDS RETIRED — J. HARRY MILLER RE-ELECTED PRES.

Mount Joy Hall association held its regular annual meeting and election Monday evening.

Following officers were nominated and elected for 1931: President, J. Harry Miller; Vice President, B. W. Brown; Treasurer, First National Bank and Trust Co.; Secretary, M. M. Leib; Stage Manager, L. G. Dellinger; D. A. Schroll was re-elected Janitor.

Owing to increased expenditures for repairs and decreased receipts during the year on motion it was decided to pay four per cent on the Hall stock for the year and also to pay off \$200 worth of Hall bonds.

Last year the dividend on the stock was five per cent, and \$400 bonds were retired. These are now extant \$2600 Hall bonds, on which four per cent interest is paid. Originally these were \$4,000 in bonds.

The following auditing committee was also elected: B. W. Brown, E. M. Barto and Wm. E. Hendrix.

When the Hall was built four second organizations put up \$2,000 each and \$4,000 was borrowed on bonds. In addition to these moneys, about \$4,000 more was carried in banks and finally paid from earnings. When the Hall was finished which was in November, 1896. Cheap times, it had cost in-round numbers about \$16,000. Since then, for improvements about \$3,000 more has been spent.

CREDITORS SEEK 3 BUSINESS MEN

MEN WHO CONDUCTED STORE IN THE BERNHART BUILDING LEFT TOWN SUD-DENLY

The mystery surrounding the disappearance of three alleged proprietors of a local store on Christmas eve, is being unraveled as numerous creditors Saturday made demands for stock which had been removed from the store.

The trio are: Nate Miller, Leon S. Fisher and a man named Sullivan, whose first name was not learned by Chief of Police Elmer Zerphey, who is investigating the disappearance.

According to Chief Zerphey, the trio leased the store room two months ago and started to stock it with clothing and furnishings purchased on credit. The store did not appear to be doing a large business, but numerous crates and boxes were delivered and sent away from the store.

Residents of Mount Joy who went to the store on Christmas eve found the place gaily covered with Yuletide decorations and a sign hanging on the door—"Out—Will be back in fifteen minutes."

George R. Brenneman, of Elizabethtown, who rented the trio the store, entered the building Saturday with Chief Zerphey and discovered the shelves were empty with the exception of a few pieces of merchandise, although both the large windows have a fine display of merchandise.

Representatives of the B. Lurie and company and the John M. Davidson company, both Lancaster wholesalers, notified Chief Zerphey that they had sold large quantities of goods to the trio on credit.

Three Persons Hurt WHEN AUTO OVERTURNS

When their auto overturned on the old Marlboro-Lutz Pike, near Marietta, Sunday, three persons were slightly hurt.
