H. M. Kauffman, Manor township, was elected vice president by the Pennsylvania Threshermen and Farmers Protective association at the final session of its eighteenth annual convention. H. L. R. Anderson, Grove City, and J. A. Rose, Harrisburg, were named president and secretary-treasurer, respectively.

John F. Weaver, secretary of the Lancaster County Supervisors' association, warned that contractors throughout the state are seeking to abolish the township reward system and the association urged that the plan be retained. Another resolution upheld the Sunday Blue Laws.

Local Horse Shown
"Sure Crop" 19 1/2 hands high and said to be the biggest horse in the world was on exhibition in the farm show building and attracted much interest. It was shown by the Reist Seed company of this borough.

Members of the Lancaster County Fruit Growers' association who made possible a county apple exhibit by contributing to a total of 21 bushels with six separate varieties are: Farm Acrent F. S. Bucher, Amos H. Kauffman, Walter Lenole Morse Brossman, C. Maurice Hershey, Henry Garber, W. J. Bruckhart, H. S. Nolt, and C. B. Snyder. The required packages were donated to the association by the Marvyl concern.

All six Master Farmers of Lancaster county attended the sessions. In addition to the three who are officers, the local group included H. S. Nolt, Columbia R. D. 1; Henry Garber, Mount Joy; and C. B. Snyder, Clay.

J. Shelley Kaylor, aged nine, of Elizabethtown R. D., who won the reserve Grand Champion award, received \$351 for his animal. The price of 34 cents a pound, paid by Arbogast and Bastina, Allentown, was the highest figure ever paid in the history of the Farm Show for a reserve champion. It compares with 20 cents for last year's reserve champion.

Ira M. Herr, Salunga butcher, purchased the steer which won a second place in the Cumberland County 4 H club for 17 and 3/4 cents a pound, or a total of \$191.70. He also purchased another animal for 15 1/2 cents a pound which weighed 995 pounds.

TOOK 9 TREES, PAYS FINE BY PLANTING 1,000

A citizen of New York State is still paying off one of the strangest Christmas debts so far recorded.

When charged by an officer of the state conservation department with cutting down nine evergreen trees on forest preserve land to sell as Christmas decoration, he was fined the customary penalty of \$10 for each tree.

But unable to pay the fine, he begged to be permitted to work out his penalty by replacing the nine trees with 1,000 more.

Under this agreement, the offender is now busy repaying his debt to the scenic beauty of the state by planting 1,000 balsams where nine grew before, according to the department's report to the American Game Association.

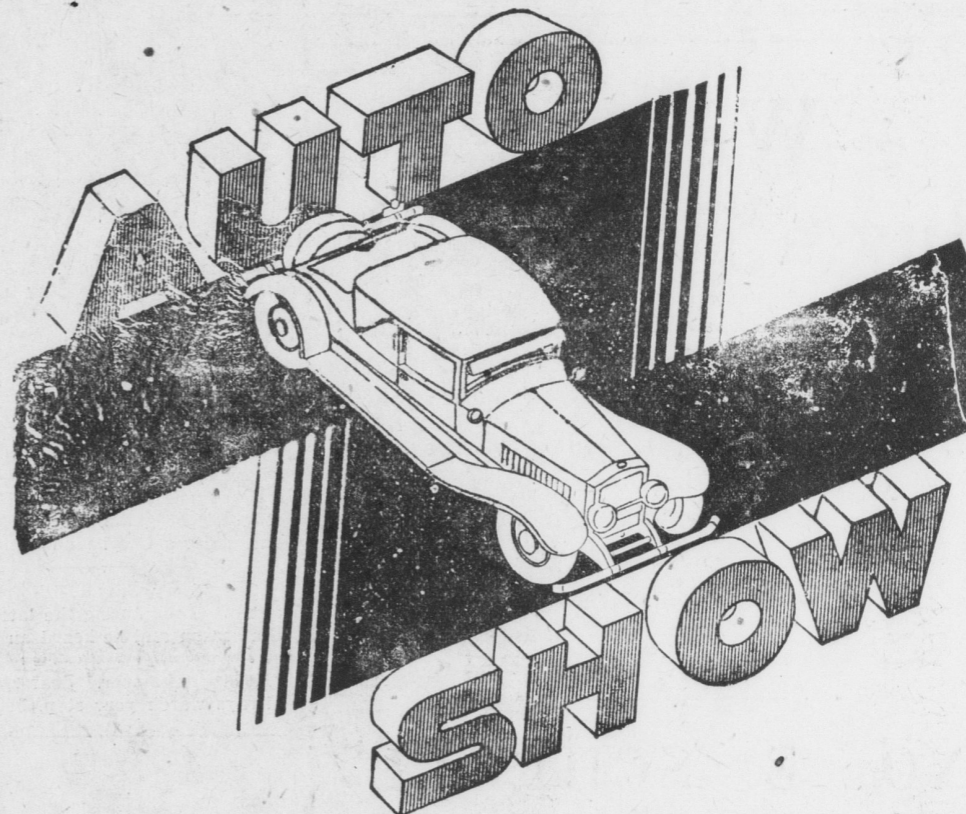
