der hit his leg and knocked him heavily to the highway.

Geib, according to Chief Zephy's report, was going west on Main street and was traveling at a moderate rate of speed. He had stopped his car at a gasoline filling station about a hundred yards east of the scene of the accident and his car was slowly gathering speed.

He was immediately removed to his home and Dr. D. C. Stoner attended him. The ambulance was summoned and he was taken to the Lancaster General Hospital.

Deputy Coroner Harry O'Neill, who was called to investigate the man's death, said that his injuries consisted of several fractured ribs and a punctured lung.

Mr. Hoffman was well known in the community. For many years he was a clerk in Mr. H. S. Newcomer's hardware store on East Main street but has lived retired for some time.

Mr. Hoffman was the last of his family, a brother, Henry Hoffman, having died about a year ago. He was unmarried. Two nephews Roy, of this place and Clayton, Rolette, N. D.

Mr. Hoffman was born in Mount Joy in his late residence. His father was a saddler and incidentally he learned that trade. He attended school here, and was in the high school for some years under the late Douglas Patterson. After leaving that school he attended the State Normal School at Millersville. When a young man he went West and for some years had a clerical position on a Mississippi steamboat, running from St. Louis to New Orleans. At his father's death he gave up steamboating and returned to Mount Joy, where he has resided ever since. From 1912 to 1915 he was Burgess of Mount Joy. Mr. Hoffman was an active Odd Fellow, and was a representative of that lodge frequently. He was president of the Richard Club, of this place, of which he was a charter member, since 1915. Was president of the Mt. Joy Cemetery Association and a member of the Presbyterian church. Also a member of Friendship Fire Co. In politics he was a Democrat.

The funeral will be held from his late home Friday afternoon at two o'clock with interment in Mt. Joy cemetery.

Reports from the southeastern part of the State indicate that thousands of flocks of crows have been congregating there. Commission officials suggest organized crow hunts and drives on their "rookeries" as a means of reducing their numbers.

Plant Clean Potatoes

In securing potatoes for planting next spring it is safest to buy disease-free seed direct from a reliable source or to use potatoes only one year remove from such a source. Care of the seed in storage is another safeguard for the ensuing crop.

Grow Good Layers

Breeding for high egg production is an important poultry husbandry practice. Select eggs from high producing stock or buy baby chicks from flocks known to have a reasonably high average of production.
