### **NEW BUILDINGS**

AMONG THEM WAS \$80,000 FOR A NEW AND MUCH NEEDED POST OFFICE BUILDING IN MOUNT JOY-OTHER TOWNS GET AL-LOTMENTS.

About the best news handed out from Washington, D. C., in many years, was made public here Saturday when dispatches from Washington Friday night revealed that Lancaster county's allotment of the \$504,000,000 public buildings fund totaled \$555,000. Included in this allotment is an ap-

propriation of \$80,000 for a new postoffice building in Mount Joy. According to the report sent to Congress by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and Post Master General Brown the funds will be used for the erection of new alterations to old

Federal Buildings. Columbia led the list of individual allotments in Lancaster county wth a total of \$105,000. Other allotments were as follows: Manheim, \$100,000: Elizabethtown, \$90,000; Ephrata, \$90,-000; Lititz, \$90,000; and Mount Joy,

\$80,000. Allotments to cities and boroughs adjacent to Lancaster County include Reading, \$850,000; Harrisburg, \$750,-000; West Chester, \$80,000; Red Lion, \$80,000; Boyertown, \$80,000, and Elk-

ton, Md., \$75,000. It will be remembered that about a year ago the department advertised for bids for a new postoffice building here but as there were no applicants, we presume the Department considered this the next best move-erecting its own building.
