Farm Real Est. Pre War Values

FROM REALTORS AND FARMERS THEMSELVES, AGRICULTURAL DIS-TRICTS, NOT ENCOURAGING.

Pennsylvania has gradually declined during the past decade, and is now at the pre-war level, according to the bureau of statistics, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture. The average value of farm property throughout the Commonwealth

40 per cent above the 1912-1914 level in 1920, declined to only 14 per cent above that level in 1925, and continued downward reaching a point just one per cent above, this spring. When compared to value in the

mid-west, the readjustment in Pennsylvania has been less drastic and less severe. For example, in Iowa, real estate values in 1920 (Turn to page 6)
