Improve Egg Size Egg size can be improved somewhat by growing pullets to full size before production starts. Proper feed and care will fit the pullets for maximum production during the winter months.

Home-made bread (like mother used to make) without the labor and worry of old-fashioned methods is the promise of an Italian inventor, Mentore Teodori, of Ferrara.

Signor Teodori, after an automatic bread making machine which promises to make homemade bread popular again.

His machine, called "Autopane" or in English "Autobread," does everything from grinding the wheat to baking the bread in one operation. Fresh grain, yeast, salt, water and oil are poured into the machine and a short time later finished loaves are taken from the oven.
