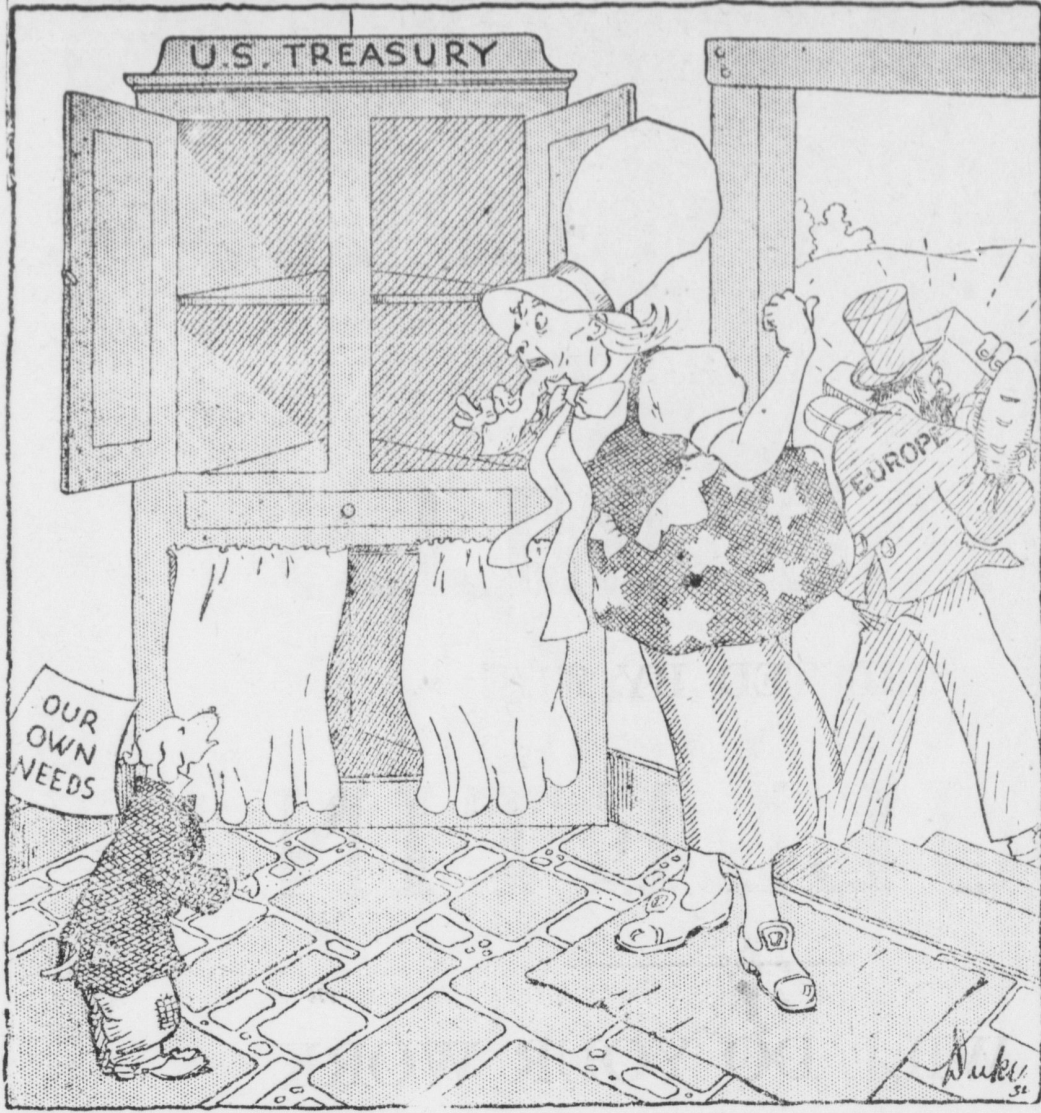


IT LOOKS LIKE EVERYTHING HAS BEEN LOANED OUT

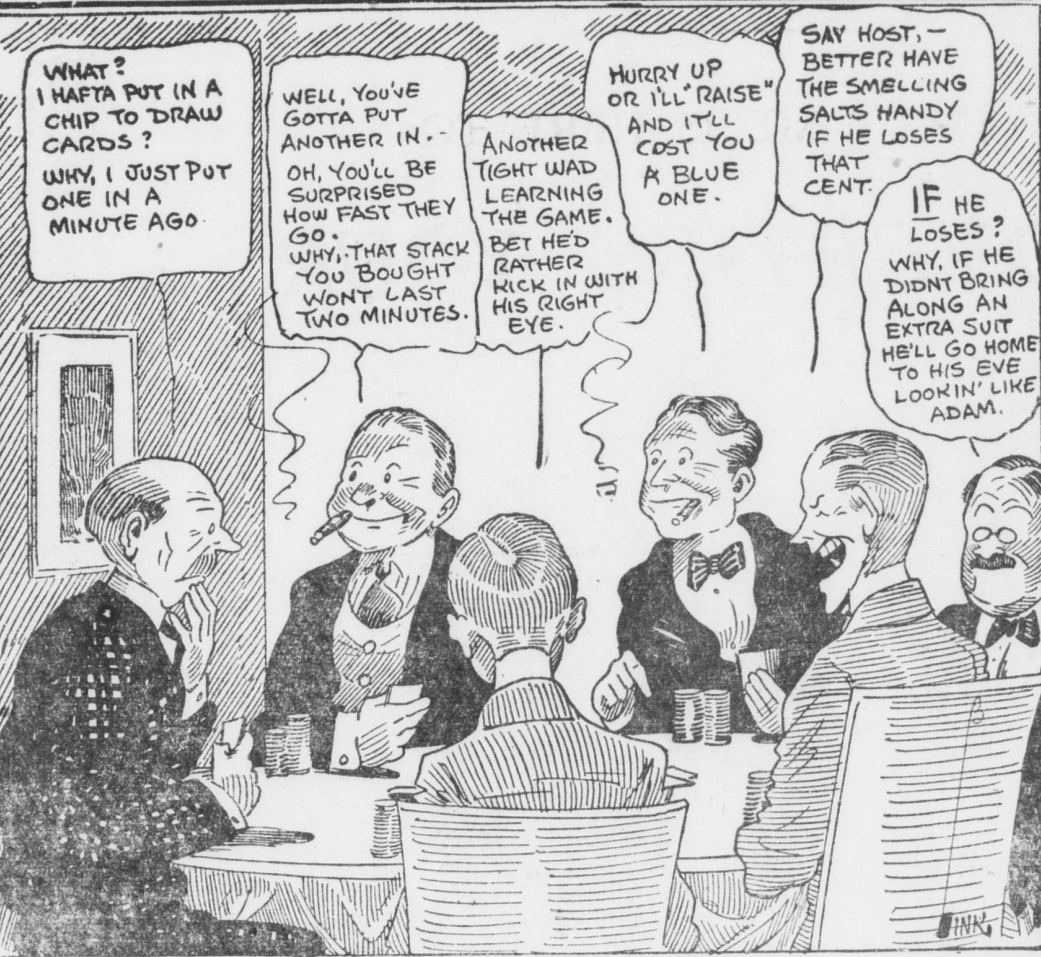

COURT PROCLAMATION. Whereas, the Hon. John M. Groff, Pres., and Hon. B. C. Atlee, Assoc.
