STATE BUREAU SUPERVISES CONSTANT CAMPAIGN TO ASSURE HONESTY TO MR. AND MRS. GENERAL PUBLIC

Inspectors of weights and measures in Pennsylvania made a total of 1,942.494 examinations in 1931, according to compilations made by the Bureau of Standard Weights and Measures of the Pennsylvania Department of Internal Affairs, and announced today by Secretary of Internal Affairs Philip H. Dewey. Included in the list of inspectors operating in Pennsylvania are those named by the counties, first, second and third class cities and deputies in the Bureau of Standards in the Department of Internal Affairs.

STATE COMMISSIONER REIST EXPLAINS WIDE APPLICATIONS OF LEVIES NOW BEING MADE BY THE DEPARTMENT

Mr. R. M. Carter, mercantile appraiser of Lancaster county, last week mailed bills to those who owe this particular tax. There are a number, however, who owe mercantile tax of which he has no knowledge and inasmuch as there is a penalty of \$1,000 for a refusal to make a return all business people should be on the safe side and make a report.

With mercantile appraisers now in the field, many persons engaged in small businesses are unaware of their obligations under the mercantile tax law. Some of these have been summarized by Linn L. Reist, commissioner of the bureau of county collections of the Department of Revenue, in the belief the information may be of general interest.

Buys 26,867 Acre For Hunting Area

VARIOUS PLOTS ARE DISTRIBUTED IN TWENTY-TWO COUNTIES THROUGH PENNSYLVANIA GAME COMMISSION REPORTS

At recent meetings of the Board of Game Commissioners they approved the purchase of a total of 26,867 acres distributed in twenty-two counties of the State. A large part of the cost of this land will be paid for out of the extra allotment of \$125,000.

Purchase contracts are now being prepared for these 26,867 acres. The tracts are distributed through the State as follows: Lycoming county, fifty-two acres; Susquehanna, 105; Columbia, 216.4; Huntingdon, 197; Clarion, 258.8; Crawford, 389; Wyoming, 5000; Cambria, 1000; Fulton, 575; Bradford, 660; Somerset, 100; Somerset, 1700; Jefferson, 100.
