Trying to raise pullets on growing mash," says C. S. Johnson, head of the poultry department of Purina Mills. "In one case it takes eight months of feeding to get a pullet ready to lay and in the other, five. The added cost of feeding those extra three months just about offsets the cost of feeding a good growing mash. "Why let pullets drag it out and lose those fall eggs," questions Mr. Johnson. "Why prolong the dog's pain
