**Atlantic Liners Now Running Between New York and Boston**

The utmost in coast-wise luxurious travel has been attained by the two big new Atlantic liners, Saint John and Acadia, operated by the Eastern Steamship Lines, which will run between New York and Boston this winter. This is the first time such magnificent ships, such palatial sea-going hotels have been in the service between these two great cities. Each is a 10,000-ton steamship launched this year and fitted with the latest appliances designed to insure comfort and safety. Each has everything that can be found in a modern hotel, many rooms with baths, showers, twin beds, double beds, telephones that connect with all parts of the ship, wonderful ventilating devices, dancing spaces more elaborate than those in most hotels and night clubs and an orchestra favorably known to theater-goers and radio audiences.
