New Inspection Starts Jan. 1st

THE STATE HIGHWAY PATROL WILL CONTINUE ITS DRIVE AGAINST STICKERLESS AUTOMOBILES—CAR OWNERS TAKE NOTICE

The State Highway Patrol is continuing its campaign against uninspected motor vehicles and against operators who cannot furnish proof of inspection during the compulsory inspection period that ended September 30, the Department of Revenue announced here.

To date, 1,134 operators have been arrested by the Highway Patrol for failure to have their vehicles inspected. Inspection stickers affixed to motor vehicles by official inspection stations during the last compulsory inspection period must remain on the vehicles until the close of the 31, Secretary of Revenue Leon D. Metzger explained today. Operators not displaying stickers on their vehicles must be able to produce a certificate of inspection issued by an official inspection station and bearing the registration number of their vehicle in ink.

The first compulsory inspection period of 1933 starts January 1 and continues for three months. The stickers will be similar to those used in the last campaign with the exception that the colors will be red and blue.

2,000 Will Work On Roads Here

A NEW THIRTY-THREE MILE PROGRAM WILL BE LAUNCHED UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF THE RELIEF BOARD

Two thousand men now employed on Lancaster county roads by the State Highway department will be continued on a new 33 mile program to be launched shortly. It was announced by the County Emergency Relief Board after a conference with department officials.

"The recent 33-mile program has just been approved by the state," Senator John G. Homsher, the chairman of the board, said.

"As soon as that program gets underway, our \$50,000 work-relief program will be launched," he explained. "We are now at work on road maps, deciding the location of improvements to be made. The \$50,000 comprises the September and October allocations made to Lancaster county by the State (turn to page 5)

After a few blasts last Tuesday, all the workmen quit and Hillegas left. Friday and Saturday Hillegas put in an appearance and after picking around a little, left and has not been seen since. This morning Mr. Harry Haldeiman, owner of the farm on which the mine operations were in progress, posted a number of trespass notices, forbidding Hillegas or any of his employes to go on the premises.

To date Hillegas, the promoter, has not paid a cent on the farm, neither have any of his many workmen received as much as a thin dime toward their wages.
