Members of other species are incolerent of strangers. Some webs are suited to snare very small and deliate insects that breed in water close to the spiders' dwelling place. Other spiders live all their lives under stones, and feed almost exclusively on creatures that rawl. They shun moths and butterflies and other insects that flap their wings.






