CONFESSION TO HAVING STARTED THREE BAD FIRES

Sanford Landis, twenty-seven, of 212 Rockland St., Lancaster, has confessed to firing the lumber yards at the Hoffer Brothers planing mill, Elizabethtown, on April 28; a garage in the rear of the home of Ferdinand Bender, Millersville, Monday night, and a barn "somewhere along the Marietta pike near Oyster Point" about a year ago.

The admission that he had set the third fire came as a surprise to police, as they had no knowledge of a barn fire of incendiary origin. Checking over the records, it was learned that the barn of Charles Musser, of Lancaster R D 8, along the Marietta pike, had been destroyed by fire at a loss of \$3,000 on June 24, 1932.
