### Probe County Man's Death

**WILLIAM BROWN, COLORED, OF BILLYMYER, WHO DIED IN THE HARRISBURG HOSPITAL, CLAIMS INJURIES BY A HIT-AND-RUN MOTORIST**

State Highway Patrolmen at Harrisburg are investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of William Brown, thirty, colored, of Billymyer, who died in the Harrisburg hospital Sunday. In a death-bed statement Brown declared that he had been struck by a hit-and-run motorist, but police stated that they were not satisfied with this explanation.

Brown was found lying on Currant street, near Cumberland. According to his story, he had been run down by a machine in Shantytown, just east of Wildwood park, early Sunday morning. He died four hours later.

An autopsy performed by Dr. R. L. Perkins at the Harrisburg hospital, revealed that death had been caused by shock but failed to reveal any injuries. The cause of the shock could not be determined.

Patrolman James Haggerty, who investigated, declared that he was convinced that Brown had not been struck by a hit-and-run motorist, but would not disclose his reason for the opinion.

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### What Penna's Governor Says

**EXACTLY WHAT IS GOING ON AT HARRISBURG AND WHY BY OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE, GIFFORD PINCHOT**

No slightest excuse exists for violence and bloodshed during strikes.

In the textile strike at Lansdale and in the bituminous strike in Fayette County, we have had examples in recent months of useless and unnecessary disorder. And in these same places we have seen peace and order restored by the exercise of common sense, forbearance, and tact.

The Lansdale agreement and the Union guide agreement, both signed in my office at Harrisburg, will turn out, I hope, to be the greatest steps taken in my time toward outlawing disorder during industrial strikes in Pennsylvania.

Those agreements should supply a firm basis for the prevention of violence to persons and property. And when violence is outlawed then we get down to the business of actual strike settlements.

What happened in Pennsylvania during the recent strikes sets a new mark. For the first time in the history of the Commonwealth, the State Police and the National Guard, when called out to preserve the peace, were ordered to see that the workers were protected in the rights guaranteed to them by the Constitutions of Pennsylvania and the United States.

Heretofore, except when I was Governor, the State Police and the National Guard were always used to help sheriffs, their deputies, and company police beat workers into submission. They were sent out to break strikes, not to enforce the Constitution.

But in the recent strikes, all the power of the Commonwealth was (Turn to page 8)

### Rust, Wildfire Spreading Here

**TOBACCO DISEASES WERE DISCUSSED AT A MEETING OF THE GROWERS MONDAY — CROP CUTTINGS IS REPORTED**

Rust and wildfire have appeared in the tobacco fields in virtually every section of the county. It was disclosed at the monthly meeting of the Lancaster County Tobacco Growers Association held Monday afternoon at the tobacco experiment station near Lancaster.

F. S. Bucher, County Agent, and Otto Olson, government agent, in charge of the station, led the discussion of tobacco diseases. They called upon growers to begin fighting disease in the seed beds.

S. S. Bard, of East Petersburg, reported on the government acreage reduction plan, saying that a few contracts were still being received but that in all probability the campaign would close definitely by today.

He said that growers representing about 20,000 acres had signed in Lancaster county, thus renting 10,000 acres to the government. As a result about 250,000 acres will be distributed to local growers before November 1, he estimated.

Harry Swarr, of Landisville, in a discussion of the crop, recommended that tobacco should not be cut until three weeks after suckering. Down around Washington Boro a number of crops are now being cut.
