WILLIAM BROWN, COLORED, OF BILLMYER, WHO DIED IN THE INJURIES BY A HIT-AND-RUN

State Highway Patrolmen at Harrisourg are investigating the circumstances surrounding the death of William Brown, thirty, colored, of Billmyer, who died in the Harrisburg hospital Sunday. In a death-bed statement Brown declared that he had been struck by a hit-and-run motorist, but police stated that they were not satisfied with

Brown was found lying on Currant street, near Cumberland. According to his story, he had been run down by machine in Shantytown, just east of Wildwood park, early Sunday morning. He died four hours later.

An autopsy performed by Dr. R. L. "Wooden Anniversity" of Perkins at the Harrisburg hospital, revealed that death had been caused by shock but failed to reveal any injuries The cause of the shock could not be determined.
